Springfield Post Plans Erection of Large Structure on Land Purchased at Seventh and B. Streets for \$1300 from Francis Travis.

As a s'te for a public auditorium Springfield post American Legion purchased this week the property at Seventh and B, streets owned by Miss Francis Travis. The property is 100 x 120 feet and is bounded by Seventh and B. streets and alleys on two sides. The consideration was \$1300.

Springfield post plans are to build a large auditorium which will cover the entire property at a-cost of \$4000 or \$5000. This will be done by degrees.
