OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

La Grande's first observance of a community music week will be May 29.

The Lutheran Brotherhood of Oregon will convene in Silverton May 2, 3 and 4.

F. A. Elliott, state forester, is attending a series of forest fire conferences in eastern Oregon.

The annual meeting of the Oregon State Retail Jewelers' association will be held in Salem May 11 and 12.

By a vote of 53 to 8, a commercial course was voted for the Cottage Grove high school at the budget meeting.

The new \$95,000 depot of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railroad at Astoria will be opened to the public on May 4.

The past week several dogs in Greenville and Sweet Home have been bitten by rabid dogs, causing alarm among residents.

The load limit for motor vehicles on the Old Oregon Trail in the Blue Mountains, recently imposed by the state highway commission, has been lifted.

Members of Capitol post, American Legion, with headquarters in Salem, have launched a plan whereby they expect to erect a home for the organization.

The Clatsop county court has awarded a contract to John Slotte & Co. for the grading of three miles on the Nehalem highway. The contract price was \$51,131.54.

John Day highway is to be finished without delay. The last gap, 21 miles, has been ordered advertised for grading at the May meeting of the highway commission.

Two hundred members of the Baptist churches in Lane and Douglas counties convened at Springfield for the annual meeting of the Umpqua Baptist association.

A budget of \$25,000 for the coming year was voted at the 33d annual conference at Astoria of the Lutheran Columbia conference of the Augustana Synod of North America.

Coos county must rearrange its proposed bond election for \$700,000, as a mistake in the order of election necessitates a new call before the bond attorneys will approve the issue.

Milton A. Miller of Portland has been appointed by Governor Pierce, a delegate from Oregon to attend the national child welfare commission to be held in New York city May 15 to 20.

A. L. McEwen of Athena, breeder of registered Spotted Poland China hogs, has tendered each of the pig clubs in Umatilla county one of his pigs as a special award for good work during 1925.

Sylvia Louise, a 4-year-old girl, is dead following a beating administered by her grandmother, Mrs. M. C. Paton, with whom she had been living on a farm in the Meda district, about 35 miles south of Tillamook.

Because of the projected operations of the Shevlin-Hixon company in Klamath county this year, the Bend Iron works will establish a large plant in Klamath Falls early this summer, according to announcement.

W. J. H. Clark of Portland, state senator from Multnomah county, was elected superintendent of the Oregon employment institution for the adult blind in Portland. He will succeed Mrs. R. B. Goodin, who has resigned.

The state highway commission has sought permission from the public service commission to establish an overhead crossing over the track of the Central Pacific railroad in Klamath county. The cost of the proposed improvement was estimated at \$33,260.

The navy department will detail a representative at once to go to Astoria and make a careful study of the situation at the mouth of the Columbia river, so far as it concerns the national defense, Senator McNary was assured by Secretary of the Navy Wilbur.

Sportsmen of Coos county have been surprised by an announcement coming from the Coquille river district recently that catfish were becoming common in that stream. A quantity of this variety of fish were planted in the Coquille several years ago.

Announcement of the plans of his company to attempt to divert much of the halibut packing business from Puget sound to the Columbia river was made at Astoria by J. R. Burke of the Burke Fish company, who is superintending rebuilding of the old Lindenberger cold storage plant in that city. Mr. Burke announced that a new dock will be constructed, extensive repairs made to the building, and new equipment installed.

The Clatsop county court has announced that in the future all contractors doing county work must furnish personal bonds and that contractors' bonds offered by bonding companies will not be accepted.

County courts, under a law enacted at the last session of the legislature, must remit penalty, interest and costs when property owners pay their tax principal prior to May 1, 1925, or prior to the date on which certificates of delinquency could have been foreclosed.

Since his recent discovery of the cause of salmon poisoning in dogs, Dr. C. R. Donham, instructor in veterinary medicine at the Oregon Agricultural college, has been devoting all spare time to working out an effective treatment for dogs affected by the poisoning.

Bert (Oregon) Jones, who with other convicts made a sensational escape from the state penitentiary at Salem on the morning of March 28, 1924, was returned to the prison from Sacramento, where he was arrested on a charge of stealing automobile accessories.

The heaviest sentence ever given in Umatilla county for violation of prohibition laws, as far as records disclose, was imposed at Hermiston when Justice West sentenced Art Spinning and J. D. Fahlen to serve one year each in the county jail and fined them \$1500 each.

Buena Vista addition of Oregon City has the honor of producing the first roses of the season in Clackamas county. Mrs. Eva Williams of Sixteenth and Division streets has a beautiful climbing Hermosa rose in bloom, the blossoms making their appearance Easter Sunday.

Oregon farmers to the number of 10,007 have availed themselves of loans totaling \$30,948,850 from federal land banks, joint stock land banks and federal intermediate credit banks since these agencies were first established by law, according to the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural foundation.

Crater lake national park will be ready for opening on the regular date, July 1, C. G. Thompson, superintendent has announced. Mr. Thompson and a crew of men are on their way into the lake and with high explosives will clear away the snow from the entrance so that cars can reach the lodge.

Unless Governor Pierce reinstates Ben Dorris of Eugene to the state fish commission a recall movement will be initiated and prosecuted to completion by the sportsmen of Oregon. This was the announcement made public in Klamath Falls by R. J. Kirkwood of Portland, secretary of the State Sportsmen's association.

An initial petition looking to the referendum of the tobacco tax law enacted at the last session of the state legislature was filed in the offices of the secretary of state at Salem. The petition was signed by officers of the Oregon Retail Cigar Dealers' association and individual tobacco dealers in the city of Portland.

Legionnaires from all American Legion posts in central Oregon will join in an attempt to make the McKenzie highway across the Three Sisters divide passable before the latter days of June, when the state convention of the legion will be held in Prineville. The legionnaires plan to co-operate with the bureau of public roads.

Questions are being asked of other railroads in this state to determine if there is any opposition to the application of the Oregon, California & Eastern railroad, known better as the Strahorn line, to the interstate commerce commission for the right to extend its line to Lakeview from near Klamath Falls, the system headquarters.

The state board of control has remitted to the city of Astoria approximately \$28,000, representing the first half taxes for the year 1925 paid by the property owners of the municipality. Under a law enacted at the 1923 session of the legislature state taxes paid by property owners of Astoria were to be remitted to the city over a period of seven years.

Estimates of the Hood River valley fruit crop vary. The bloom has been more scattered than in any past season. In instances growers who had more than 30,000 boxes of apples last season say they count on 10,000 boxes this year. One east side grower who had over 25,000 boxes in 1924 says he does not expect over 6000 boxes. Estimates for the 1925 tonnage ranges all the way from 800,000 to 1,800,000 boxes.

Rhea Luper, state engineer, has filed in the circuit court of Malheur county, an order in the Owyhee river water adjudication. There are 217 water rights involved, with 29,250 acres of irrigable lands represented. The order provides that the water shall not exceed three acre feet an acre during the irrigation season, April 1 to October 15. Another limitation is that not more than one acre foot of water shall be used on any single acre of land during any one month prior to June 1, and not more than three fourths of an acre foot during any calendar month after June 1.
