SECRETARY JARDINE TO INSPECT DEPARTMENT FIELD WORK IN WEST

In order that he may become familiar with the work of his department in the field, Secretary of Agriculture Jardine will leave Washington on May 27 for a six-week's inspection trip through the west. Four-fifths of the 26,000 workers in the department are at stations scattered throughout the country outside of Washington, a fact which led the Secretary to decide on this early visit. At a later time he expects to go to the Southwest and through the East and South.

The trip of Secretary Jardine will take him to California, with stops in Kansas, Utah and Idaho on his way west, and in Washington, Oregon, Montana, North Dakota, Nebraska and Iowa on the return. As the tour is primarily to field inspection, the secretary is accepting but a limited number of speaking engagements.
