ORDINANCE NO.

An ordinance to improve 17th street from Main street north to the Brattain property in the town of Springfield, Oregon, by grading and graveling.

THE TOWN OF SPRINGFIELD DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section One. The Common Council of the Town of Springfield does hereby declare its intention to improve 17th street from Main street north to the Brattain property in the town of Springfield by grading and graveling the roadway of said Street between said points 18 feet in width, grading said street to proper sub grade, and placing upon a 10 foot strip through the center of said grade, crushed rock and earth approximately six inches in depth, and doing such other improvement work as may be necessary to a proper and complete improvement of said street, in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor, to be prepared by the town engineer and filed with the Town Recorder.

Section Two. The costs of said improvement shall be assessed to and be borne by the abutting property benefited thereby; and there shall be included as a part of said improvement, engineers charges incurred therein, not exceeding five percent of the contract price.
