Hans Lovvold, a prominent Astoria resident, entered a plea of guilty in federal court in Portland to a charge of violating the tariff act of 1922, through the importation of contra-band goods into the United States, and was fined \$1000 and sentenced to three months in the Multnomah county jail. Lovvold was charged by the government with having brought 100 cases of whisky and 10 cases of beer to Astoria from Willapa harbor.

The Oregon Legislature will convene at the recent session of the legislature, providing for the protection of motor vehicle owners through the registration of titles, probably will necessitate a special meeting of the state emergency board to authorize a deficiency appropriation of between \$50,000 and \$100,000. It was announced by the secretary of state that the administration of this law would cost the state department more than \$50,000 during the first year of its operation. No appropriation was provided in the measure to care for this expense.

Members of the state judicial council, which was reauthorized at the recent session of the Oregon state legislature, were appointed by Chief Justice Thomas A. McBride of the supreme court. Members of the council include John L. Rand, justice of the supreme court; Fred S. Wilson, circuit judge of Wasco county; C. M. Thomas, circuit judge of Jackson county, and Walter H. Evans, circuit judge of Multnomah county. The purpose of the council is to investigate and recommend uniform and more simple rules of judicial procedure in the Oregon courts.

UNCLE TOM'S CABIN

In many respects W. J. Harvall's "Uncle Tom's Cabin" is the most important of the season's productions. original version of Mrs. Stowe's story and that it has been unanimously accepted by the press, pulpit and public of America and England.
