Many improvements are already being made in the Fair Ground in anticipation of a record breaking crowd. A rest cottage has been completed and new fencing and walks are under construction. CONSTRUCTION WORK NOW AT HIGH PEAK

Many Loggers Recently Laid Off Find Employment on Projects

Portland, June 18—(Special) That a large majority of the several thousand loggers recently laid off at west coast camps have either gone to the pine districts of the Inland Empire or have found employment largely in construction work, which is now at its highest peak, is indicated by reports from 4L employment service offices in various northwestern cities received at 4L headquarters here today.

Almost without exception the reports show that there are few unemployed loggers in the fir districts.

A surplus of men is reported from the pine region east of the Cascades. Conditions in the various districts are given as follows:

Portland—While there is sufficient help in this city to meet all present demands, there is not a large surplus. A considerable number of men have already left for the harvest fields of Texas and construction work here in the Northwest has absorbed a large number of loggers recently laid off.

Small box factories up the Columbia river are now busy on the season's cut and they have required some help from here. Canning factories are operating with full crews.

Raymond, Wn.—All large logging camps in this district have been closed and all sawmills on Willapa Harbor are operating. Street paving in this city and state highway work nearby, have given temporary employment to a large number of men. There are few
