Mr. and Mrs. Fred Zumalt from Myrtle Point are spending the week at Thurston.

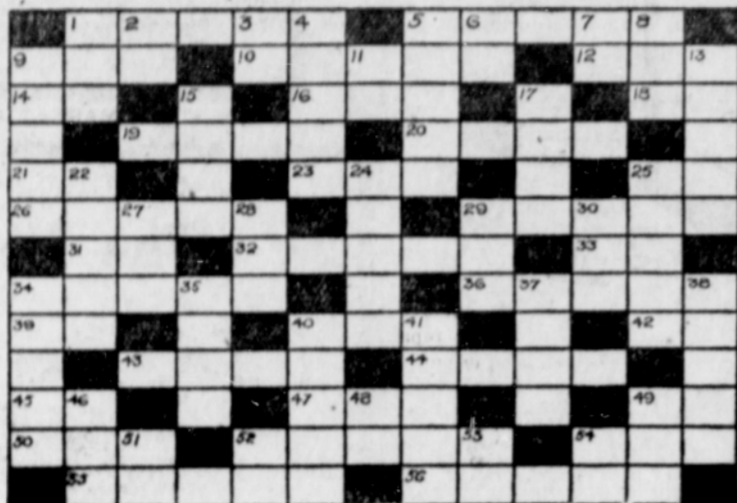
Mrs. Gossler enjoyed a visit with her daughter Emma and child, last week. She returned to her home in Portland Monday.

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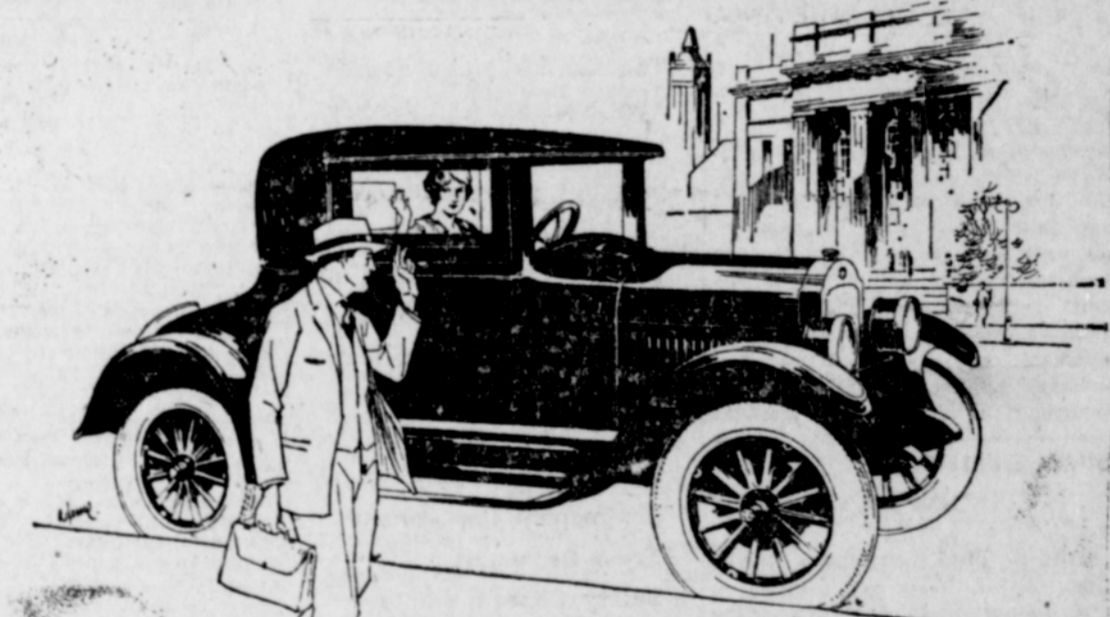
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
