## What Becomes of All the Milk?

What becomes of the oceans of milk produced annually by the 25,000,000 cows being milked in this country? In the first place, old bossy kicks over the bucket, which with other spillage takes away about 2 per cent of the grand total, according to best estimates of the United States Department of Agriculture.

More dependable statistics than mere estimates are to be had, however, for the remainder. Last year the total production was 114,666,201,000 pounds, of which 46.9 per cent was used in manufacturing different products; 46 per cent for household purposes, and 4 per cent for feeding calves.

Of the manufactured products, creamery butter utilized about one fourth of the total production, farm butter about 11 per cent, cheese of all kinds 3.6 per cent, ice cream 3.4 per cent, and condensed and evaporated milk 3.7 per cent.

## FINE RACING PROGRAM FOR LANE COUNTY FAIR

Eugene, Oregon, July 30, (Special) The fastest racehorses in the Northwest are included in the 75-race entries already in for the Lane County Fair at Eugene September 22 to 25, according to Kelly C. Branstetter, secretary of the Fair Board. Eugene is included in the regular circuit of the North Pacific Racing Association, due to the fact that the dates are arranged so that the horses can be brought here for the event, it is stated by Chet Daniels, in charge of the race program here.

In addition to the many new horses, most of the old favorites of former years will be back, it is said. Several horses are expected to use the local track for training purposes, since the turf is already in fine shape. Alicia McKlyo, owned by A. Edstrom, is now being worked out here. The track is one of the best in the state.

The racing program will last three days this season. On Wednesday, the second day of the fair, 25 horses are entered in the two main events, the 2:20 trot and the 2:13 pace. On Thursday, 27 horses are already booked for the 2:14 trot and the 2:17 pace. The fast races on the last day, the 2:10 trot, and the free-for-all pace, have 20 speedy entries.

The largest purses ever offered will tempt the racers. A total of \$3,000, will be divided as follows: 2:20 heat, three heats, \$400; 2:13 pace 3 heats, \$500; 2:14 trot, 3 heats, \$500; 2:17 pace, 3 heats, \$400; 2:10 trot, 3 in 5, \$600; free-for-all, 3 in 5, \$600.

Officials of the races will include W. W. Branstetter, local race enthusiast, and Clarence Simons.

Old favorites who will race again include Stoney Logan, owned by F. M. Anderson; Hal Paxton, Jr., a real winner owned by Fred Woodcock; Joe Ansel, Oregon Bond, Northern, Exodus, Hal Nann, Lillas Lee, Prince Zolack, Hal Fitzsimons, and others.

In addition to the regular races, running races, with overnight entries, will be a feature. These will be unusually good this year, as several owners have already declared they will enter, says Mr. Branstetter, secretary.

The Lane County Fair will have a number of new and unusual features this year, says Mr. Branstetter. More space has been prepared for agricultural exhibits, and the automobile and automotive power show will be a main event. A large number of entries and space reservations have already been made, it is stated. Boys and girls club work, under the direction of Andrew Collier, club leader for Lane county, will also receive special attention.

The fair grounds have been extensively improved, a new rest cottage built, and the entire grounds will be fenced. A record crowd for every day is expected, it is said, by those in charge.

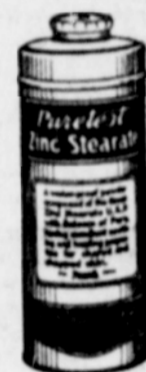

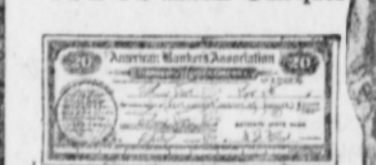
