## Church at Pleasant Hill Observes 75th Anniversary

As August 4 is the 75th anniversary of the foundation of the Pleasant Hill Christian church special services were held at the church Sunday morning, August 2. After the singing by the congregation W. L. Bristow, a grandson of Elijah Bristow, gave a brief and highly interesting history of the church. His report was as follows:

"Elijah Bristow went into the Christian church at Hlandenville, Illinois, in 1837. In 1846 he came from California to Oregon and settled at what is now Pleasant Hill. On the fourth of August in 1850 twenty-three persons with Elijah Bristow as organizer, met and organized the Pleasant Hill Christian church, in a small school house built on what is now the southwest corner of the cemetery, taking the Bible alone as their only rule of faith and practice. The following were charter members; Elijah Bristow, Susana Bristow, Sarah B. Bristow, W. W. Bristow, Zilphia Bristow, Rigdon, Able Bristow, Elizabeth Russell, John Russell, James K. Hendricks, Able K. Bristow, Almira Bristow, Polly Bowman, Wm. Bowman, Robert Callison, Polly Callison, Harrison Shelley Jane Shelley, El'lar Briggs, Mary Briggs, Elizabeth Bristow, Isaac Briggs, Elizabeth Hendricks, Michael Shelley, Lena Shelley.

W. L. Adams preached the first sermon after the church was organized. He came to Pleasant Hill to pronounce the marriage ceremony of Johnson Basket and Miss Katy Bristow. This is supposed to be the first couple married in Lane county.

A preacher by the name of Davis preached a few sermons.

Prominent among the first preachers were John Rigdon, Gilmore Callison, Chas. Bradshaw, Jas. Fisher, G. O. Burnett, Bro. Elder, J. E. Murphey, Alex. McCarty, Dr. Perkins, John Powell and Philip Mulkey.

The congregation continued to meet in the old school house until the summer of 1854 when the new school house was built by Robert Callison on the present school site.

The old stile block that served in ladies mounting their horses at the church is now encased in a glass cabinet in the Encarvor room at the Christian church. The steps in this old block were cut by E. L. Bristow and J. W. Parks.

Jno. T. Gilroy was one of the first clerks of the church and held office for 22 years, resigning when he left the community. There were no Sunday schools in the early days, people came to church in ox wagons and on horseback.

The congregation met in the new school house until 1875 when the chapel just south of this present building was erected. The dedicatory sermon was preached by Elder T. F. Campbell, president of the Month-mouth college, on the second Sunday in July, 1875. His text was taken from Revelations 21-5: "And he that sat upon the throne said: Behold I make all things new."

The first minister employed in the new building of 1875 was P. R. Burnett.

During the 75 years of the Pleasant Hill church has only on a very few special occasions failed to meet on the first day of the week to attend the ordinances of the Lord's house. Elijah Bristow, seeing the needs of the community and following his

method of loyalty to the church, deeded 40 acres to the church, school and cemetery.

The present church building was dedicated May 13, 1913.

After Mr. Bristow's history of the church the choir gave a special song and President Sanderson of the Bible university gave a fitting sermon dwelling on the faith, vision and hospitality of the pioneers. President Sanderson personally knew several of the charter members of the church and had much to say in praise of them.

The above report of W. L. Bristow was taken from a very valuable book of his in which he has clippings, copies of songs, poetry and letters dating back as far as 83. The collection was begun in '86 and contains pictures of the pioneers.

Although on account of threshing the church was not filled there were present many who were direct descendants of Elijah and Susana Bristow. There were 4 grandchildren, 5 great grandchildren and 4 great great grandchildren of Elijah Bristow. Mr. and Mrs. Darwin Bristow of Eugene were present. Mrs. Fox, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Johnson Basket, the first couple married in Lane county, was also in the congregation.

## FARM REMINDERS

Two lime-loving crops in Oregon should never be sown in succession even after liming unless lime applied has been excessive says the experiment station. Different soils may react differently to different amounts of lime applied. A thorough acidity test will often save considerably in lime applications.

"I don't believe the results from the use of lime on grain are very marked the first year," says J. J. Doerfler of the Inyan Karia farm near Silverton, "but our records show that it does increase yields even on grains the second and the following years."

Growers in the Willamette valley will apply the third codling moth cover spray not later than August 8. The first moths of the second generation appeared in the rearing cage July 25. It is estimated that the maximum number of moths will appear during the first week in August. The egg hatching period will begin about August 3, and the peak of the egg hatching period will probably be about the middle of August. The poison spray should be on the foliage, pears, and apples before the worms hatch. Increasing the dosage to five pounds of powdered arsenate of lead to 200 gallons of water in this spray is a frequent practice.

In going through the potato fields often outstandingly vigorous plants may be seen—large growers, that are healthy and not next to any diseased plants. Such healthy plants should be marked with a stake for separate digging. If these are good producers, they should be saved for next year's seed plot, says the extension service.
