Traffic experts in all parts of the United States are virtually agreed that a "National Code of driving signals must be adopted and schooled into drivers of automobiles,

The reason for this is that the sale of automobiles each year is far outstripping the development of new roads; the congestion is becoming worse and worse; and the increase in the number of accidents is growing at an alarming rate. This, too, despite the fact that the automobile is becoming so common that virtually every driver-is a good driver.

In some cities and some states speed limits have been raised in the effort to "get traffic out of the way." This seems to be practical - and would be more so were all drivers operating their cars under a national code of signals-so that all drivers other drivers were going to do.
