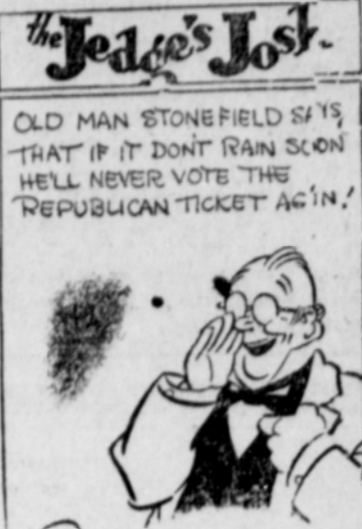

## OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

### Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

Formal dedication of the new home for the Salem lodge of Elks has been set for sometime in November.

Receipts at the Eugene postoffice in August this year were 13 per cent greater than those in August of last year.

Six hundred and eighty-six cars of fruits and vegetables were unloaded in Portland during August, the greatest of any month in its history.

The new telegraph line to serve the Western Union and Southern Pacific over the route of the new Natron cutoff is expected to be in operation in a few weeks.

A northern Morrow county fair will be held at Boardman Friday and Saturday. The fair will exhibit crops and livestock produced with irrigation in that district.

Because he slept while his campfire grew from a small blaze into a forest fire, D. J. Sullivan was fined \$50 and costs by Justice of the Peace Turner at Madras.

Budget estimates that total \$7,155,138.60, or \$3,165,138.60 more than the tax levying power of the city, have been asked by all departments of the city of Portland for 1926.

The United States forest service has just published a map and log of the Oregon Skyline trail from Mount Hood to Crater lake and will furnish them upon application.

Receipts at the Portland postoffice for the month of August amounted to \$230,554.01, as compared with \$217,720.06 for the same month a year ago, or a gain of \$12,834.95 for the current year.

Three machines were placed in operation at the Miles linen mills, which were established at Salem recently at a cost of more than \$150,000. Other machines probably will get into operation this week.

The 46-mile section of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company's long distance lines between Arlington and Umatilla in eastern Oregon is to be reconstructed at a cost of approximately \$30,000.

A grass fire near the farm home of C. W. Miller in Flournoy valley, Douglas county, set fire to the farm buildings and the home, together with its contents, the barn and other outbuildings were destroyed.

The state board of control has authorized a reorganization of its forces at the state tuberculosis hospital to care for the many new patients that will receive accommodations in the new buildings now under construction.

The trials of Tom Murray, Ellsworth Kelley and James Willos, convicts, who on August 12 shot their way out of the Oregon state penitentiary, were set for October 5 by Judge Percy Kelly of the Marion county circuit court.

Gus Norquist, 55, a native of Sweden, committed suicide in the county jail at Albany by cutting two gashes in his throat and then tearing his throat open with his hands. His act was caused by despondency as a result of ill health.

Acting under a law enacted at the last session of the Oregon legislature, plans are now being formulated looking to the appraisal of all state property. This is the first time that such an appraisal has been attempted in this state, it was said.

Complaints that the contractors in charge of erecting the new state training school for boys near Woodburn had refused to pay common laborers double time for work in excess of eight hours per day have been filed with the state board of control.

A. D. Kern & Co. of Portland have received the contract of the Eugene water board to lay the new McKenzie river pipe line for the city water system and work is expected to start as soon as equipment can be procured. The company's bid was \$265,131.

City officials of Gearhart passed an ordinance calling for a special election to be held on September 18 for the purpose of putting before the voters a proposition of bonding the city for \$30,000 to be expended in putting in a modern water system.

Shipments of lambs to eastern markets have been finished this year by the Smythe ranches, according to Dan P. Smythe of Pendleton. The final shipment went last week and consisted of 17 double deck cars. Some of the feeder lambs sold for as high as \$15.75.

Mrs. Catherine J. Adams, known as the mother queen of Oregon for the last five years because of the fact she was the oldest woman member of the Pioneer association of Oregon attending the annual sessions of that gathering, died at the home of her son, William Adams, at Hillsboro. She lacked but one month of being 97 years of age.

Work of filling in the city of Reedport with dredgings from the Umquaga and Schofield rivers is under way. A fine brown sand is being obtained from the Umquaga river channel for the fill, which dries off as soon as pumping stops. This project will cost nearly \$100,000.

Representatives of the Housewives' council of Portland, the state grange, Umatilla Rapids association and a number of other organizations held a meeting in Salem to discuss proposed legislation authorizing the development of hydro-electric power in Oregon under state supervision.

Of the \$390,431 lent wheat farmers in the frost-devastated areas of Oregon under an act of the 1925 legislature \$193,452 has been paid back together with interest at the rate of 6 per cent. With the exception of those in Morrow county all loans returned to the state have been paid in full.

A rich gold strike, thought to be the famous Beaver creek mine of the early days of Crook county, was reported 17 miles from Paulina on the line between Crook county and Grant county. Already more than a dozen claims have been staked. The find was made by G. P. Lee, veteran sheep man.

Major Cotner of the army engineer's office of Portland has designated September 10 for a hearing in Marshfield on the proposal to bridge Coos bay between Marshfield and East Side with a bascule bridge costing \$300,309. The people of Coos county voted bonds for the bridge at a special election July 13.

Edward Ostrander, member of the public service commission, is in Chicago to attend a conference involving the western railroads' application for an increase in rates. It originally was proposed to request an increase in rates of approximately 11 per cent, but this figure recently was reduced to 5 per cent.

With election of officers for the new year and the unanimous indorsement of a resolution opposing construction of the Skyline trail along the Cascade range in Oregon as a menace to health through the contamination of the water supply, the 51st annual convention of the Oregon State Medical society came to an end at Medford.

More gasoline was sold in Oregon during July, 1925, than in any other similar period since the motor vehicle fuels tax law became effective, according to a report prepared by the secretary of state. The July distribution of gasoline aggregated 11,277,703 gallons. Taxes received by the state as a result of the July sales aggregated \$346,694.40.

The largest individual orchard deal in months in the Rogue river valley was announced at Medford in the sale of the Bruce Wilson ranch of 150 acres, 50 of which are in pears. Albert Anderson, its owner, sold it for \$32,000 to A. C. Chew, Oklahoma City, Okla., merchant, who will make extensive improvements including the building of two country homes.

There were a total of 2556 traffic accidents in the state of Oregon during July, according to a report prepared by T. A. Rafferty, chief inspector for the state motor vehicle department. Of these accidents, 1940 occurred in the city of Portland. The report showed that four persons were killed as a result of the accidents while 449 persons were injured.

Kid Gilstrap, who in November, 1923, was shot by deputy sheriffs in a raid on the farm of his uncle, Joe Gilstrap, seven miles west of Junction City, has filed suit through his uncle, who is his guardian, against Clyde N. Johnson, ex-district attorney, Fred G. Stickle, ex-sheriff, and the several deputy sheriffs who took part in the raid, seeking \$75,000 damages.

Extension of the operation of the Oregon sterilization law to include all state institutions, probably will be attempted at the next session of the legislature. This was indicated in a general discussion of the benefits of the sterilization act at a meeting of the state board of control at Salem. The law, as now operated, affects only inmates of the state penitentiary and state home for the feeble-minded.

Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, was cited to appear before Judge L. H. McMahan in the circuit court at Salem on October 22, and show cause why he should not designate the Oregon State Motor association as his sole agency in the city of Roseburg, for the purpose of registering motor vehicles owned by non-residents. The suit was filed by Joe Dunne of Portland, on behalf of the motor association.

Lightning has been the chief cause of fires through the forests of the northwest this year, the report of the district forester for the season ending August 31 shows. Of a total of 1384 fires in the national forests 933 were caused by lightning. Smokers caused 140 and neglected campfires 171. The area burned over within the national forests was 32,166 acres of forest lands and 2538 of private. It cost \$158,607 to suppress fires. Only nine were reported from the Santiam forest, the best showing of 23 federal forests.
