OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

The North Morrow county fair was held Friday and Saturday at Boardman.

Two first prizes were won by dahlias entered by Dan P. Smythe of Pendleton at the Spokane fair.

There are now 936 miles of improved highway in Marion county, according to J. T. Hunt, county judge.

Meehke Bros.' sawmill at Beaver creek, near Oregon City, was destroyed by fire with a loss of about \$12,000.

The hardware store owned by C. V. Carmichael at Monitor, 12 miles south of Canby, was destroyed by fire with a loss of \$10,000.

An increase of at least 20 per cent in the entering class is indicated by records at the registrar's office of Oregon Agricultural college.

The Portland community chest campaign this year will open Monday, November 16, and is scheduled to close Tuesday, November 24.

Threshing was delayed in Oregon by rain, but in many localities is practically complete, says the weekly crop summary of the weather bureau.

One thousand ninety-six new students have applied for admission to the University of Oregon for the fall term, 144 more than applied a year ago.

Roger D. Pinneo, traffic manager for the port of Astoria for the last five years, has written to the port commission expressing his desire to resign.

The largest salmon hatchery in the southwestern part of the state is to be established on a tributary of South Coquille river, about 3 1/2 miles from Powers.

F. E. Hinkle of Corvallis was shot and killed on the Yachats river. It was stated that Hinkle was moving in the brush and was shot when mistaken for a deer.

Forest fire danger is not yet over in western Oregon notwithstanding the recent heavy rainfall, according to Nelson F. Macduff, supervisor of the Cascade forest.

The Eugene Farmers' creamery of Eugene has been awarded first prize in the creamery butter competition at the California state fair at Sacramento, according to word received.

Offers of 23 cents have been made for new crop Oregon hops, and a limited amount of business has been done in clusters at that price, but growers as a rule are holding out for 25 cents.

Railroads operating between Salem and Portland filed with the public service commission new tariffs reducing materially the rates on canned goods in carload lots between the two points.

Wilbur Burgess, 41, one of the owners of the Burgess-Evans sawmill near Noti, 20 miles west of Eugene, was killed when he fell upon the main drive belt and was thrown against a pile of timber.

An indictment charging murder in the first degree was returned by the Polk county grand jury against W. R. Lloyd, who is alleged to have shot and killed Clinton I. Baun of Independence September 1.

Under supervision of Tom Craig, assistant to Matt Ryckman, acting superintendent of hatcheries, 1,817,000 trout were planted last week in the McKenzie river, creeks flowing into it and nearby lakes.

Frank Way, wealthy central Oregon sheep owner, was found guilty of manslaughter by a jury at Klamath Falls following his trial on an indictment charging him with the murder of Timothy Murphy, Klamath sheepman.

Whether the so-called loopvent plumbing system permitted by the Portland plumbing code is of sufficiently high standard to comply with the state plumbing code is to be determined by a committee of three competent plumbers.

Evidence of what is thought to have been a murder, perhaps committed within the past year, was unearthed by road laborers on the McKenzie pass highway near Lost lake, when the skull of a man and a pair of overalls were dug up by the workers.

Business of mills of the West Coast Lumbermen's association was not so active in the week ending September 5 as for the preceding week, 107 mills reporting sales amounting to 100,491,914 feet, manufacture of 103,134,746 feet and shipment of 97,659,036 feet.

A total of 3605 persons visited the battleship Oregon in Portland harbor in July, according to a report filed with the state treasurer. Accompanying the report was a remittance of \$901.25, which has been credited to the battleship Oregon commission. Under the law money received from persons who visit the battleship is applied toward maintenance of the craft.

J. M. Myers, superintendent of construction of the North Umpqua road, has received orders to complete the forest development road into the Steamboat ranger station, a distance of two miles from Williams creek, to which the road has now been built.

The city of Gresham has filed with the state engineer application covering the appropriation of water from Hiney Spring and seepage from a gulch tributary of the Willamette river for a municipal supply. The cost of the proposed development is \$15,000.

All surveys of the Oregon Trunk railway between Bend and Klamath Falls have been completed, according to officials of the northern lines. The surveying crews have been withdrawn and the blueprints are ready for submission to the interstate commerce commission.

W. R. "Jinks" Taylor, Pendleton chief of police, colorful figure of the old west and ex-sheriff of Umatilla county, died in the St. Anthony's hospital at Pendleton as a result of in-

juries sustained when his horse fell with him and a fracture was sustained at the base of the skull.

Oregon brought the total of its surfaced roads under state highway supervision up to 3014 miles at the end of 1924, having surfaced or built up to grade 339 miles during the year, the bureau of roads has announced. As the total mileage of the state highway system is 4339.7, there remain to be completed by surfacing 1325 miles.

The public service commission has rescinded an order issued recently suspending indefinitely the new tariff filed by the Amity Mutual Telephone company. As a result of the order issued by the commission the new rates adopted by the telephone company will become effective immediately.

Persons affected by a law enacted at a recent session of the legislature providing that penalties, interest and costs accruing on taxes levied for the years 1921, 1922 and 1923, shall be remitted, may recover such penalty, interest and costs provided they were paid through error after the act became effective.

Plans for the proposed new guard tower at the Oregon state penitentiary were approved by the state board of control. The tower will be of brick and cement construction and will be located near the main gate and outside of the prison enclosure. The cost of the tower was estimated at approximately \$500.

On verification of reports that the Klamath Indians have experienced three bad crop years, Secretary of Interior Work has authorized a general payment to them of \$200 each out of the tribal reserve receipts from timber sales. The aggregate payment to the tribe members will amount to \$345,200 and 1226 Indians will participate in it.

The total registration in the Portland public schools will reach the highest peak in the history of the system in this school year, in the opinion of C. A. Rice, acting city superintendent of schools. On the basis of present attendance records, Mr. Rice believes 48,000 students will be enrolled in the schools of the city as compared with 45,139 last year.
