Perry R. Edmiston was born at Marlan in Smith county, Virginia on April 22, 1842. He had two brothers and one sister who have preceded him in death. His father owned a large plantation. His father passed away when he was a small boy after which he made his home with his grandparents. At the age of sixteen years he enlisted in the Southern army of the Civil war and served as an officer under General Lee. He was married to Miss Jennie Dutton on August 12, 1875, they having passed their 50th wedding anniversary last month. To this union seven children were born—three daughters and four sons—one son having passed away several years ago. Mr. and Mrs. Edmiston came to Oregon in September, 1875, settled on their farm at Thurston where they have resided ever since excepting one year which was spent in Idaho. Mr. Edmiston has been in failing health for several months but was confined to his bed only four days. He passed out of this life very peacefully at his home at noon on Friday, September 18, 1925 at the age of 82 years and 5 months. He leaves to mourn his loss his wife, Mrs. Jennie Edmiston, six children, 17 grandchildren, one great grandchild, which was born only 2 hours before his death.
