NEW THEATRE MAY BE BUILT IN CITY

Plans Revived by Mr. Seavey and Page for Large Structure on Main Street Between Bank and Sneed Store; Hinges on Lease to B. Signed.

Plans for a new theatre building in Springfield have again been revived by J. A. Seavey and L. K. Page, who own property between the Commercial State bank and the Sneed Department store, on Main street. Negotiations are under way with a Portland theatre operator and a definite announcement is expected by Mr. Seavey within a few days. It is understood that if an agreement on a lease can be reached that the building will be constructed.

The lot between the two buildings is 66 feet front and 120 feet deep. Mr. Page owns the 26 feet next to the Sneed store and Mr. Seavey the 40 feet next to the bank building. Community walls on either side are already erected.

A theatre that will seat 500 or 600 people is planned. It will be modern and up-to-date with a pipe organ and elaborate decorating and lighting effects, according to the tentative plans.

BUDGET COMMITTEE IS SELECTED BY BOARD

Dallas Murphy, J. C. McMurray and A. F. Flowers to Help Make School Budget Estimate for Year.

J. C. McMurray, A. F. Flowers and Dallas Murphy were appointed to comprise a budget committee to meet with the school board and arrange the expenditures for the coming year at a meeting of the board at the city hall Tuesday evening. SPRINGFIELD TO PLAY BROWNSVILLE HERE OCT. 16

A complete football schedule, with three games at the home gridiron and three away from home, has been arranged for the Springfield high school. The first game will be played here October 16, against Brownsville.

A game with Junction City, there, on October 24, is second on the list, and the locals will play Lebanon at their field on the following Friday, October 30. The second home game will be against Oakland, on Armistice day, November 11. The Harrisburg game will be played there November 20, and the Cottage Grove game, the last of the season, will be here November 26.

With the main essentials learned, the team is now practicing out special plays under the tutelage of coach V. D. Bain. Several new men have appeared, who will probably win places on the eleven. At present three men, Ed Louk, Joe Thompson and Whitenee are out with temporary injuries but they will probably be in shape before a game.

No definite lineup will be announced by the coach until just before the first game. Pollard and Lombard are fighting it out for center position; while Hastings, Harper, K. Geiger and Charles Thompson are playing at end. Joe Thompson, Whitenee and W. Geiger are out for the tackle positions, and Whitenee, with Louk and Morse, are also playing at guard.

The backfield positions are to be divided between Moon, Lewis, McPherson, H. Cowart, William Cox, and perhaps W. Geiger and Charles Thompson. McPherson or Cowart are the best bets for quarterback. Hastings has made the best punting record this year.

Season tickets for all the home games, and costing \$1 will be placed on sale by the students.

ANGALINE HILLS, 87, DIES; WAS PIONEER AT JASPER

Mrs. Angaline Hills, aged 87 years and 9 months, and a pioneer of Jasper, died at her home there Monday. Mrs. Hills came to Oregon from Peoria, Iowa with an ox team in 1864. She settled with her family near Albany, but soon moved to Jasper vicinity.

The deceased is survived by four children, Mrs. Dora Lyons of Jasper; Mrs. Clara Morehouse of Eugene; Mrs. Effie Elliott of Jasper and Perry Barber of Coburg.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2:00 from the Jasper church, Rev. F. L. Moore of the Springfield Methodist church having charge of the service. Burial was at Mount Vernon cemetery.

LEASE ON OLD SHOP SITE BEFORE COUNCIL MONDAY

Proposal of Eugene Council and Lease Will be Offered After Attorney's Examination.

The lease from the city of Eugene on the old railroad shop site will be brought before the Springfield City council at its regular meeting Monday night. The city attorney has examined the lease and proposal as submitted by the Eugene council and pronounces it legally all right.

The Springfield council met in special session last Tuesday evening. It was found that some sidewalk work had been done that was not included in the sidewalk contract and further work of this kind was ordered suspended until the council had a chance to confer with the city attorney. Councilmen declared themselves that the overhanging trees must be cut eight feet above the sidewalks before the rainy season sets in. Notice will be served on people who do not comply.

The Mountain States Power company is preparing to renew its power line on Sixth street. The council decided to ask the company to put the poles in the alley.

SPRINGFIELD BRIDGE INSPECTED BY STATE

Structure Looked Over to See If It Is Safe; Highway Commission to Survey McKenzie Road to Thurston for Next Year's Work.

An inspection of the Springfield river bridge has been made by State Bridge Engineer Ricketts on request of County Engineer P. M. Morse and a decision as to whether it is dangerous or may be used a few years yet is expected to be announced in a few days. Mr. Ricketts also inspected the Ferry street bridge in Eugene.

A survey of the McKenzie highway from Springfield to Thurston with the idea of bringing it up to state specifications next year will be made in a few days by the state highway department according to Raymond Walsh, district engineer. The road has not been taken over yet by the state but the state has been maintaining the surface.

If the county brings the grade of this road up to state specifications there is some talk of paving it next year. When the county turns the road over to the state then it will be maintained by the highway commission either as a macadam road or paved highway.

Engineers will also run a line over the old street car piers to determine the route, said Mr. Walsh. If the state and county decides to use this route later on another survey will be made with the bridge department and data on the river secured.
