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OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

A war on diphtheria is being waged in Coos county and the county health service is watching every avenue for symptoms.

Representatives from 13 Red Cross chapters in eastern and central Oregon met in Bend Monday and Tuesday for a regional conference.

The community chest plan for raising funds for benevolent and charitable purposes was adopted by the Roseburg chamber of commerce.

Six garages and two automobiles were burned in a fire which swept through the buildings owned by the Algoma lumber company at Algoma.

The Associated General Contractors executive board voted at Dallas, Tex., to hold its annual meeting in Portland. The session will be held in January, 1926.

A 10 per cent increase in postal receipts at the Eugene office during September this year over the same month last year was reported by Darwin E. Yoran, postmaster.

Apple picking in the vicinity of Elgin is now in full swing. There are approximately 300 persons employed in the various orchards and in the three packing plants in Elgin.

R. N. Clark of Portland, district manager of the Missouri Paint and Varnish company, was killed when his automobile turned turtle on the Pacific highway about 10 miles south of Salem.

Through the efforts of S. H. Boardman and Carl Doring, Boardman is to have a golf course which will soon be in readiness. The course is being laid out opposite the railroad station at Messner.

A total of 9149 China pheasants and 614 Hungarian partridges have been liberated from the three state game farms so far this year, according to the September report of E. F. Averill game warden.

After crossing the continent in 11 days traveling time by automobile Representative Sinnott of The Dallas is in Washington, D. C., to begin work in preparation for the meeting of congress in December.

A joint commission, including members of the federal farm loan board and members of the house and senate banking and currency committees, will visit Portland October 23, during an inspection trip through the northwest.

William Wellman, age 55, farmer residing east of Silverton, was unloaded from the rear of a wagon backed to the brink of a 150-foot cliff. The horses started and he was pitched over the cliff. Death was instantaneous.

R. E. Weniger, sheriff of Shoshone county, Idaho, and Charles J. Bloom, deputy sheriff, arrived in Eugene to take charge of Ernest Aello, 20, who was arrested in a railway construction camp above Oakridge on a charge of murder.

Two hundred seventy-one more pupils had enrolled in the Eugene schools during September this year than in the month last year, according to a report issued by David J. Jones, city superintendent. The total registration is now 3407.

I. C. Russell, 30, of North Albany a lineman for the Mountain States Power company, dropped lifeless into the arms of his brother, who was working just below him on a pole at Sheed. The man had touched a high voltage wire and was killed instantly.

By an overwhelming majority the people of Medford at a special election voted for a new \$975,000 city water system with a source at Big Butte springs, more than 30 miles away. A bond issue of \$50,000 for a new temporary city hall was also voted.

Of 43,721 tourist automobiles inspected at the station at Baker, more than 50 per cent were operated by persons who were either "dead broke" or on short rations, according to a report filed with Governor Pierce by H. H. Weatherspoon, commissioner for the fifth horizontal district.

A crash between a Troutdale interurban street car and an automobile at Arata station, near Portland, resulted in the death of the three occupants of the auto. The dead are J. R. Grathwohl, 38, farmer; Alta Grathwohl, 19, his wife, and Betty Grathwohl, their 2-year-old daughter.

Creamery robbers, believed to be the same who have looted numerous creameries all over the Willamette valley and at various places in the state of Washington, took 700 pounds of butter from the creamery at Jefferson, piled it on the creamery platform and left it there, evidently having been scared away before they could complete the job. Thousands of pounds of butter have been taken from the various Oregon creameries during the past few months.

The Associated Stores, of Salem, was incorporated with a capital stock of \$100,000. The enterprise now owns 12 stores, located in Salem, Dallas, Newport, Toledo, Silverton, Monmouth and Hebo, and has options that probably will increase their stores to 40.

After running through the entire fire season safely, with no fires extending over more than one-fourth of an acre, lightning set a fire which spread to an area of between two and one-half and five acres on Blowout creek, above Detroit, Supervisor C. C. Hall of the Santiam national forest, reports.

The final chapter in action brought by Jefferson county against H. C. Topping, defaulting sheriff, under American Surety company of New York, his bondsman, was closed when the surety company paid to the county clerk the sum of \$2623.19. The county clerk authorized the clerk to satisfy the judgment in full.

Verne C. Gorst, of North Bend pioneer in motor and aerial transportation carries, will receive the contract for circling air mail over the branch line from Los Angeles to Seattle with a stop at Portland if he can satisfy the postoffice department he has means available to establish and operate such a line successfully.

As a result of interest payments, expenses and various items, the state's general fund after January 1 will probably be the smallest in 10 years. This is asserted by State Treasurer Kay in commenting upon the withdrawal in September of more than \$3,000,000 of the general fund on deposit in various banks in Oregon.

Thousands of ducks and geese lie dead in Tule lake as a result of a strange malady, believed induced either by alkali water or by rank, stagnant ponds. To cope with the situation the United States biological survey has been notified, and will conduct an examination to determine what is the cause of the wholesale deaths.

Plans for the new St. Helens pulp and paper mill to be built at St. Helens by a company in which the Hawley Pulp & Paper company of Oregon City holds the majority of the stock, will be drawn at once. Ground then will be broken and it is expected that the first unit of the plant, costing \$1,600,000, will be ready for operation in November, 1926.

Robert K. Stanfield, United States senator, conferred with farmers along the River road north of Eugene Saturday regarding means of curbing the overflow of the Willamette river during freshet seasons. During the past few years the water has been washing away considerable land and it was hoped that some means might be provided to construct a breakwater to prevent it.

Oregon penitents have been granted as follows: Samuel J. Grimer, Portland, \$15 per month; Fred Hargroaves, Portland, \$12; Marvin W. Joy, St. Johns, Portland, \$12; Eliza A. Obert, Milton, \$20; Morris A. G. Christenson, Eugene, \$12; Bela H. Zimmerman, Strassell, \$12; Silvey Wood, Junction City, \$18; Charles L. Stephens, Banks, \$12; Henry M. Marsh, Medford, \$24; Johanna C. Perry, Salem, \$20.

A heavy snow storm early in the week, which turned into a hard rain, following several other such storms at Crater lake national park recently, caused all paving work for the winter to be called off. The various camp tents were struck and equipment stored until the paving work, which will probably last nearly all next summer, can be resumed next spring or early summer, weather permitting.

The Oregon-California Hydro-electric company of Portland has been granted a preliminary permit for two years for a power project on Zig Zag, Salmon and Sandy rivers in Clackamas county, the federal power commission has announced. The project consists of diversion dams, a storage dam, conduits and a power house. The estimated capacity of the project is 23,000 horsepower and the installed capacity 70,000 horsepower.

The action of Governor Pierce in vetoing the much-discussed special election measure passed by the 1925 legislature was upheld in a decision by Justice Brown following mandamus proceedings in the Oregon supreme court. The decision follows the action filed by Representative Swan of Albany, who had demanded that Secretary of State Koser comply with the provisions of the act as passed by both houses. Secretary Koser assumed the position that he could not authorize a special election after Governor Pierce had vetoed the bill.

Hydro-electric power, state-owned and operated, became a possible problem for Oregon voters with the filing of a proposed constitutional amendment with the secretary of state at Salem. The measure was presented by the Housewives' Council, Inc., of Portland, through Josephine M. Othus, president; Clara M. Simonton, director, and Mary A. Dean, chairman of the legislative committee. The proposition presents a plan for promoting hydro-electric power development, control and distribution, financed and protected by the state.

LABOR TURNOVER SHOWS DECLINE

Portland, Oct. 15 — (Special) — Nearly all employment centers on the west coast last week reported a noticeable decrease in the volume of labor turnover, according to the 4L employment letter issued here today. Fir logging and lumbering continue very active, the letter said, but there has been a slight let-up in building and construction industries which will be further reduced with the first heavy rains. This work has held up remarkably well this year.

The lessening of industrial activity in the Inland Empire districts where sawmill and planer crews are being reduced, is daily becoming more marked, the letter stated. Reports from the various 4L offices were as follows:

Portland—A falling off in the volume of orders for loggers was noted last week. Labor turnover in all lines of industry is lighter than it has been for many weeks past and jobs are easier to fill. There has been no let-up in building activity within the city. A few farm jobs are still being offered. There are more men than jobs in Portland.

Aberdeen, Wn.—Thirteen hundred men are still on strike at four Aberdeen sawmills which have been closed for over two weeks. Shafer Bros. mill 4 which was only partially affected by the strike is again operating with full night and day crews. It is reported that this company met, in part at least, the requests of its employes for an increased wage. Logging in Grays Harbor district is close to 100 per cent of normal capacity. Camp labor turnover is light. There are practically no experienced loggers seeking work.

Tacoma—There have been more men applying for jobs during the past week than has been the case for several months. Construction work has decreased. Most sawmills and logging camps in this district are operating.

Seattle—Employment boards in this city last week presented a fair volume of jobs, with calls for loggers still leading the demand for help. A number of orders for experienced shingle weavers also were posted. The Chinr Timber Co., Maple Falls, has been taken over by Irving & Kober's. It is reported, and the camps will be opened Oct. 12. Sawmill turnover continues light.

Everett—No shortage of labor in this district. Shingle mills are curtailing output and operating on a short week. Night shift at Mill C, Weyerhaeuser Timber Co., has been taken off and put on at Mill B. A night crew will be put on at the Clough mill at Stanwood. It is reported. Logging camps are busy.

Bellingham—Employment in this district showed a slight increase last week when logging was resumed at the Wirckia Bros camp. Operations at the St. Paul & Tacoma camps are being enlarged. All sawmills and fruit canneries are busy. About 200 persons will be given employment Oct. 20 at the Utah-Idaho Sugar Co's plant here.

Spokane—More men than jobs has held true in this city for the past two weeks. Sawmills are laying off men almost daily. The Diamond Match mill at Cusick has closed for the season, it is reported, and several small mills and planers are preparing for an early shut-down. Woods operations are normally active for this time of year. The Daikena Lumber Co. will soon open another camp at its Priest River operation. There are plenty of experienced woodsmen to fill all orders.
