OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

The State bank of Coburg at Coburg, Lane county, has gone into voluntary liquidation.

The annual teachers' institute for Douglas county is to be held Thursday and Friday at Roseburg.

Robert D. Lytle of Vale was elected grand chancellor of Knights of Pythias of Oregon at the grand lodge session at Eugene.

Mrs. Tom Smith of Marshfield killed a bear which disputed her right to a cluster of huckleberries on South Coos river.

W. W. Hoover of Fossil was named successor of County Judge C. O. Butler of Wheeler county, who died at The Dalles October 14.

The Jackson County Merchants' association, composed of Medford business men favor the community chest plan to handle all city charitable work.

A freak potato vine at the home of Mrs. Susan McMunn at Qulnaby has attracted much attention as it measures nine feet and four inches and is still growing.

Moonshine whisky caused the death of Orin Lacourse, 29, Southern Pacific railroad clerk. Lacourse died aboard a Southern Pacific freight train en route at Paunina.

Dr. Adix of Gresham will offer a silver cup to the junior who is selected by the faculty at the end of the year as being the most valuable student to the school.

An effort to purchase the state demonstration farm east of Roseburg and to convert it into county fair grounds will be made by the Douglas county Pomona grange.

John C. Stevens of the firm of Stev-

ens & Koon, consulting engineers, Portland, was named by Governor Pierce to succeed Rabbi Jonah B. Wise on the state board of higher curricula.

The postoffice department has announced appointment of John Simons as postmaster at Beatty, in Klamath county, and Harlan L. Asher as postmaster at Lehman, in Umatilla county.

Large timber owners in Lane county who complained to the county board of equalization about their 1925 tax assessment and were denied a reduction, have filed an appeal in the circuit court.

Fishermen who are gillnetting on Coos bay have reported the presence in large numbers of sharks about the nets, causing much loss of time by breaking nets, and additional expense for repairs.

For stealing a calf, on which charge they were found guilty, Vannie Robertson was sentenced to serve seven years and Ralph Whealey three years in the penitentiary by Circuit Judge Duffy at Bend.

Bids for concrete sidewalks and street improvements were awarded by the Scappoose council to Parker, Schram Co. of Portland, who made the lowest bid and received the contract for \$33,994.40.

Assessed valuation of property in Portland increased \$13,678,530 within the last year. Not including the property of public service corporations, the assessed valuation of all property for 1925 is \$288,170,020.

Harold Steele, 25, shot and killed his sweetheart, Miss Cressa Crane, 21, and then killed himself in an automobile four miles from The Dalles. The shooting followed a quarrel over the girl's refusal to marry Steele.

The general volume of employment offered in Oregon continues on a large scale with calls for experienced loggers leading the demand, according to the report of the United States department of labor for September.

Men and women who file suits for divorce in Oregon will have to continue to pay the extra \$5 fee fixed by act of the last state legislature, according to a decision handed down in Multnomah county circuit court by Presiding Judge Tucker.

Complaints that ducks are being shot on the Columbia river sloughs between Tongue point and Woody island by hunters who use power boats and operate by moonlight have been received from residents of that district.

After a month spent in investigating conditions in normal schools in the central states, State Superintendent Churchill has returned to Salem. Superintendent Churchill will soon leave his office to accept an appointment as head of the normal school to be established at Ashland.

A reduction of approximately \$1,000,000 in cost of government for the state of Oregon during the fiscal year 1924 was shown in financial statistics issued at Washington, D. C., by the department of commerce. The comparative figures were \$20,533,191 for 1923 and \$19,517,707 for 1924.

Five female deer were killed in one locality in the upper Deschutes country recently, according to reports brought to Bend by hunters. Four of the does had been placed in one pile. The slayers had not touched the meat of the deer.

Robert Holzgang, 47, was killed instantly on the Buckley ranch near Applegate by a woodsaw, his head being cut entirely open when the saw struck just above the left eye, after it had broken loose from fastenings on the saw rig.

Fraer brothers, who are operating a mining claim on South slough, near Marshfield, had a cleanup for the first time since they took over the Chickamin Mining company holdings on contract, and had a return of \$200. They ran 11 hours for the amount.

The sheep population of Wallowa county is now less than one-fourth what it was during the days when that county was at its peak production of wool and mutton. A census of sheep now owned and being run in the county showed the number to be a maximum of 61,500.

Hunters must not shoot ducks within a quarter mile of the Columbia river, according to a law passed by the legislature at its last session. For several years it has been unlawful to hunt geese from this strip, but this is the first year that duck hunting has been prohibited.

Business of West Coast Lumbermen's association mills in the week ending October 10 again was below the summer's average, and sales were only 95,427,955 feet. Manufactures totaled 99,081,990 feet and shipments 101,027,925 feet. New business was 4 per cent below production and shipments were 5 per cent above production.

Announcement of the appointment of a new board authorized by Secretary of Interior Work to inquire into the qualifications of settlers on the irrigation projects of Klamath Falls has been made. The members are W. C. Dalton, banker; C. A. Henderson, county agent, and Herbert D. Newell, Klamath project manager of the irrigation district.

Has Tonsils Removed—Mrs. Clara Fawver, nurse in the office of Dr. Eugene Kester, had her tonsils removed last Thursday afternoon. Mrs. Fawver won a bet from several friends by not missing a single day at her work.

Jasper Resident Ill—Mrs. J. L. Harvey of Jasper is at the Pacific Christian hospital after undergoing a major operation Tuesday.

Helping with Sale—Lyndall Gardner has been employed at the retail

department of the Booth-Kelly mill to help with the lumber sale which started Monday and will last two weeks.

Fined for Speeding—C. L. Cole and Melford Allen were fined \$3 each by Justice of the Peace R. W. Smith Monday for speeding.
