ELECTRIC LOCOMOTIVE BEATS STEAM POWER

Out of the 8,760 hours in the year, the electric engine can give 6000 hours of service which produces revenue, and the steam locomotive less than 3000.

Experts believe that "the electric locomotives comes, not to supplant, but to supplement steam as a motive power."

The electric locomotive today and for many years to come will have no more right to operate on lines of very light traffic than has the steam locomotive to operate on lines where the duty required or density has grown beyond its physical attributes to handle.

The number of ex-service men has dwindled rapidly from 1920 when more than 400 received aid. The veterans get \$25 a month with a total not to exceed \$800.

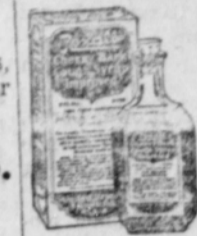
