

Building Growth In Business District Noted As Preparations are Made for Occupation of New Buildings and New Project is Pushed.

Removal of the First National bank and the E. R. Danner Motor company to Springfields newest business buildings in the near future, and plans for the circulation of a petition to the city council asking the paving next spring of the alley in the block bounded by Main, Fourth, Fifth and A streets, are indications of continued progress in improvement of the city's business district.

The alley improvement project is being pushed by various property holders which would be effected by the paving. The alley passes along the rear of the business buildings on one of the most important blocks in the city, and along the side of the new garage being erected for the Danner Motor company's occupation by George Perkins and James Laxton.
