Of all fraudulent schemes, the most contemptible is the one which preys on the helpless, sick man. Even today there are "cures" flaunted in the faces of chronic sufferers, too often aided and abetted by testimonfals from clergymen! My readers will recall only a few years back o consumption "cures" were advertised in big type, even in religious periodicals, which were in fact abettors of the crime! Ignorantly, it is true, but nevertheless parties to the swindle.

The human machine is a complex affair, the masterpiece of an almighty God. If you happen to be afflicted with some ailment that you do not understand, think twice before you buy a guaranteed, or secret-formulated "cure-all." Weigh every statement in an advertisement of the miracle-worker, the man who "wants no money." The money-back artist is as uncertain. Thousands of dollars annually are wrung from poor people on glittering promises that are never fulfilled. Trust nobody in as vital a matter as your health, unless you know them to be honorable. If you have money to give away, give it to the poor round about you, thus laying up treasures in heaven, instead of the pocket of the charlatan and impostor. .....
