MOUNTAIN CAMP SITE IS

OBTAINED FOR SCOUT USE

Members of the newly organized Springfield Boy Scout troop will have an opportunity to enjoy winter sports in the snowy heights of the Cascades as a result of plans being made by the Lane County Boy Scout council to secure a winter camp site in the Cascade National forest. Completion of the Natron cut-off will make the site accessible, it was said.

The camp is located at a place where, at Christmas time, the snow is from six to 15 feet deep. It is planned to erect 10 cabins, a permanent bunkhouse, and other improvements totaling in cost at \$5000. The camp will be available for all Scouts in the county, but only the oldest and most experienced campers will be allowed to use the winter camp, it was said.

It is probable that the use of the camp will begin next year.

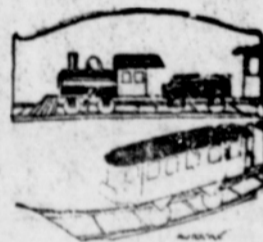

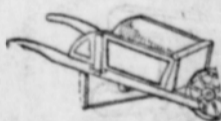

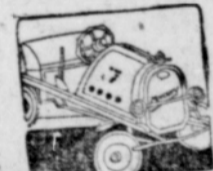
