OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

Linfield college at McMinnville has opened a campaign for a \$500,000 building fund.

The Marion county school census shows a gain of 33 for the year 1925 when compared with the census of a year ago.

Dr. G. T. Kornick of Stayton was elected president of the Willamette Valley Veterinarians' association which was organized at Salem.

A gain of 11.79 per cent was made in receipts at the Eugene postoffice in November this year over those of the same month last year.

Albany's new saddle factory, moved from Dallas, Tex., by its purchaser, A. Sternberg of Albany, is now in operation with about 25 men employed.

Of the total of \$396,431.39 loaned to farmers in the frost-devastated areas of eastern Oregon under an act of the last legislature, all but \$49,365.20 has been repaid.

The L. D. Lenon store at Monitor was entered Tuesday night and several hundred dollars' worth of dry goods, boots and shoes and other articles stolen.

Wheat land, leases on land and farming equipment outfits having an aggregate value of about \$45,000 have changed hands recently in the vicinity of Adams.

Achiel Deneweth, aged 45, of Hillsboro, killed himself by slashing his throat with a razor. His action was the termination of a series of nervous disorders and a long illness.

Reports received from Crater lake national park are that there are 29 inches of snow at the lake rim, 20 inches at Anna Spring camp and 10 inches at the Klamath entrance.

Ezra Meeker, 95, Oregon trail pioneer, is in Washington, D. C., to ask congress to authorize 50-cent pieces commemorating the 75th anniversary of the march of pioneers over this route.

Improvements, costing about \$400,000, will be made in the plant of the Beaver Portland Cement company at Gold Hill within the next few months, doubling the capacity of the present plant.

With the leaders of more than 25,000 high school students throughout the state in attendance, the University of Oregon's sixth annual high school conference held a two-day session at Eugene.

Gold Hill, which recently voted an additional bond issue of \$15,000 to reconstruct its water system, will have its water rates increased from 15 to 100 per cent, the city council has announced.

One hundred and four mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending November 28, manufactured 93,041,098 of feet lumber; sold 114,726,079 feet and shipped 87,261,655 feet.

Moving pictures are being put on every week at the Sandy Union high school, receipts from which are being used to buy library books, make payments on a new piano and maintain the band and orchestra.

There were 22,312 traffic accidents in Portland during the fiscal year ending November 30, and a total of 35 deaths from automobile accidents, according to figures compiled. Of the 35 deaths 11 were due to drunken drivers.

More than 190 Forest Grove high school students were reinstated in their classes after a spectacular strike in protest against a three-day suspension of a small group for "cutting" games to attend a recent football game at Independence.

Purchase of the plant and line of the Tillamook County Mutual Telephone company by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company was formally approved by the Interstate commerce commission, which found the merger to be in the public interest.

Another large water-filled crater has made its appearance in the Tumalo reservoir basin, the result of a cave-in of part of the reservoir floor. This new hole is 38 feet in depth and is the largest of a series of holes above a subterranean cavern.

The state supreme court has held as legal an assessment of 5 cents an acre levied against all lands in the Ochoco irrigation district in Crook county. The assessment was levied by the board of directors of the district to take care of delinquencies.

The state game commission aims to build up a stock of wild turkeys in the woods of Oregon, it was indicated in the monthly report of E. F. Averill, state game warden. The report shows that 15 wild turkeys, five from Maryland and ten from Arizona, were received by the commission during November.

F. B. Ingels, secretary of the Wasco County Stockmen's association, has written Governor Pierce urging that he send Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, to The Dalles to investigate a malady that is killing a large number of horses in that section of the state.

Members of the Oregon state game commission arrived in Klamath Falls Monday to make a thorough inspection of the lands of the lower Klamath lake before they make any recommendation as to whether or not it should be flooded and created into a bird reserve.

Stage service between Eugene and Bend has been suspended while a sled is being built for the passenger automobiles. The automobiles are to be hauled across the mile-high summit on sleds by the snow motor recently purchased by the Eugene-Sisters Stage company.

The grand jury at Albany investigating the charge of first degree murder against John Schwindt, 15-year-old Jordan school boy, as the result of his father's death from a gun wound which he suffered in a family quarrel November 4, returned a not true bill on the charge.

Prospective losses to the state resulting from loans to farmers in the frost-devastated areas of eastern Oregon under a law enacted at the last session of the legislature probably will not exceed \$2000 or \$2006, according to figures compiled by James S. Stewart, field representative of the state board of control.

The state penitentiary arsenal where Tom Murray, Ellsworth Kelley and James Willos obtained the rifles and other firearms with which they shot their way out of the institution on August 12 has been transferred from the turn-key's office in the administration building to the new guard tower erected recently outside of the prison inclosure.

Appointment of a statewide committee to present to the next legislature ways and means of rescuing present reclamation projects from disaster, putting the work on a business basis and the vote to amalgamate the Oregon drainage association with the Oregon reclamation congress featured the 11th annual session of the Oregon drainage association at Salem. Formation of the Oregon reclamation congress probably will be completed at the next annual session.

In a bill of exceptions filed with County Clerk Boyer at Salem, Will R. King, Portland attorney, contends that the state of Oregon has no right to hang Tom Murray until he has completed serving a prior sentence of 20 years for bank robbery. Murray is under sentence to hang December 13 for the murder of John Sweeney, prison guard, who was killed in the prison break August 12, 1925. Murray was serving a sentence of 20 years for robbing a bank in Linn county.

Oregon pensions have been granted as follows: Albert E. French, Portland, \$18 per month; John A. Gwynn, Portland, \$24 per month; William E. Stull, Portland, \$12 per month; George Laflour, Portland, \$10 per month; Thomas L. Garland, Portland, \$12 per month; Anna M. Pratt, Portland, \$30 per month; Nannie Pugh, Portland, \$30 per month; John A. Godfrey, Milwaukie, \$30 per month; William H. Danforth, Bend, \$18 per month; Alice A. Bain, Bend, \$30 per month; Pearl A. Bonney, Central Point \$12 per month.

Hood River county pays the highest salaries to men teachers of any county in the state, according to a report prepared by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of schools. Men teachers in Hood River county are paid an average salary of \$206.24 a month. Washington county pays the lowest salaries to men teachers, the average being \$112.77. For women teachers Klamath county ranks highest, the average monthly salary being \$146.30. Women teachers in Union county receive an average of \$100.65, which is the lowest.

The action of the state highway commission in completing and opening the trans-Willamette river bridge at Albany while an injunction was still in force against the completion of the approach on Ellsworth street is construed as contempt by attorneys for W. A. Barrett and J. J. Barrett, Albany business men, whose suit against the Union Bridge company, an agent of the state highway commission, resulted in the injunction. Members of the state highway commission have been served with formal notices that a charge of contempt of court will be pressed against them.

A protest against the request of H. B. Evans of Portland for a survey of Grassy island in the Columbia river as the property of the United States was filed with the commissioner of the general land office at Washington, D. C., by Attorney-General Van Winkle. The protest on the part of the state contends that the island sought by Evans is the property of the state and not under the jurisdiction of the federal government. It is understood that the request on the part of Evans for a survey of the island is preliminary to the filing of a formal request for its purchase. The island is said to represent valuable fishing rights.
