ORDINANCE NO. 492. An Ordinance Regulating Dances and Dance Halls.

The Town of Springfield does Ordain as follows: Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, co-partnership, corporation, society or association to conduct any dance hall in the Town of Springfield without obtaining a license or a permit therefor as herein after specified.

Section 2. Any person, firm, co-partnership, association, or society desiring to conduct a dance hall in the Town of Springfield shall make application therefor to the Town Council of the Town of Springfield in writing, stating the name of the person, firm, corporation, co-partnership, association or society desiring to conduct such a dance hall, the location of the proposed dance hall, and such other information as the Council may require.

Section 3. The amount of license required for the conducting of a dance hall in the Town of Springfield shall be and is hereby fixed at the sum of Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per annum, or fifteen (\$15.00) Dollars for each quarter year, to be paid in advance, the first quarter payment to be made at the time of the making of the application, and each three months thereafter, such payment to be made in advance at all times.

Section 4. If the Council deem the applicant for such license worthy of the same, the Council shall, upon such application and the payment of such license fee, grant a permit to such person to conduct a dance hall at the location specified in the application and any such license so granted by the Council of the Town of Springfield may be revoked by the Town of Springfield for a violation of this ordinance by the applicant.

Section 5. The term "Dance Hall" shall mean any hall, room, pavilion, or place excepting a private residence in which a dance is held and a charge is made therefor.

Section 6. All dances shall be open for inspection by any Police Officer of the Town of Springfield or any Police Officer of Lane County, State of Oregon, at all times.

Section 7. All dances shall be discontinued and all dance halls be closed on or before the hour of twelve midnight, provided, however, that upon previous application of a responsible person, society or organization, the Chief of Police of the Town of Springfield may grant such person, society or organization a permit to continue a dance until a time specified in such permit, but no tickets shall be sold or accepted for admission to such Dance Hall after the hour of twelve o'clock midnight at any time.

Section 8. It shall be unlawful to permit or suffer any person under the age of 18 years to attend or take part in any dance and remain at such dance after the hour of nine (9) o'clock P. M., unless such person be accompanied by one of his or her parents or legal guardians. It shall be unlawful for any person to make any misrepresentation or false statement as to the age of himself or herself or any other person for the purpose of obtaining the admission of such persons as to whose age such statement or misrepresentation is made, to any dance hall or the permission to remain therein, in violation of this Ordinance, and it shall be unlawful for any person to falsely represent herself or himself to be a parent or guardian of any other person in order that such person may obtain admission to such dance hall or be permitted to remain therein in violation of this Ordinance.

Section 9. All dance halls shall be brightly lighted during the progress of the dance and so-called "Shadow Dances" and "Moonlight Dances" are prohibited, and any and all dances in which the room is darkened are also prohibited.

Section 10. No intoxicated person shall be permitted in any dance hall during the progress of the dance.

Section 11. Smoking shall not be permitted in the dance hall proper, nor in any ante-room reserved for ladies, nor in any hallway or passage way leading to such dance hall.

Section 12. Any person or persons who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof in the Recorder's Court of said Town, be punished by a fine of not less than two dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars and costs of prosecution, and in case of default of the payment of such fine may be committed to the town jail of the Town of Springfield for one day for each \$2.00 of such fine.

MASTER BASKETBALL COACH WILL TEACH

University of Oregon, Eugene, Dec. 17.—(Special).—Marking a distinct advance in the athletic progress of the West, Dr. Walter E. Meanwell, head basketball coach at the University of Wisconsin and called the "Miracle Man of Basketball," will conduct a coaching school at the university next summer, according to announcement by Fred L. Stetson, director of the summer season.

Meanwell is regarded as the outstanding basketball coach in America. His record at Wisconsin is considered one of the marvels of modern athletics. His teams have won 165 games and lost only 23; placed first eight times and were never below third in their conferences in eleven seasons. Thirty-one members of the all-star team out of a total of 65 in 12 seasons have been from Meanwell's teams.

A two weeks school, consisting of intensive courses for high school and college basketball coaches will be conducted by Meanwell. The basketball wizard has been giving coaching courses with Knute Rockne at Notre Dame and Wisconsin, in which more than 850 coaches have attended.

Mr. Meanwell is the originator of the pivot and short pass, five-man defense style of play, which in its variations is the basis for most of modern basketball. Meanwell's methods and technique have been spread by the several thousand coaches who have attended his various summer courses since 1912. Some of his ex-pupils now recognized in their work are: Olson of Ohio State University; Ruby of University of Illinois; Williams of University of Iowa; Levis, formerly of University of Indiana and now of Wisconsin; Bond, University of Missouri; Chandler of Iowa State; Tebell of North Carolina.

"I guarantee to discuss and to demonstrate in full, the methods I employ in my conference seasons," Meanwell telegraphed in discussing the school at Eugene.

THE CHRISTMAS SEAL; WHAT IS IT FOR?

"Christmas Seal time is here again, and you are already doubtless familiar with the design of the 1925 Seal. It shows two candles set in the traditional holy and mistletoe of the holiday season below a red double barred cross, the official emblem of the anti-tuberculosis crusade throughout the world.

About 300 years ago Shakespeare wrote in the Merchant of Venice about a candle throwing its beams like a 'good deed in a naughty world'. Many are the conditions that have changed since Shakespeare wrote in 1598. Three hundred years ago even deeds meant less than they do now for people lived shorter lives to profit by them. The average human life then was only 33-2 years. Scarcely long enough to become well grown up, certainly not long enough for that rare enjoyment of being a grandparent. Disease then raged in many forms and decimated humanity with terrifying epidemics. Modern medical science was unknown.

"Since that time more than 21 years have been added to the duration of the average man's life. Think of it, twenty-one years more to enjoy the increasing marvels of these modern days! Seven of these extended years, about one-third of the whole gain in human existence since Shakespeare's time, have been added since the development of the Christmas Seal only 18 years ago.

"The good deeds the Seal represents have done their share in lengthening human life by helping to subtract 100,000 names from the annual death roll of tuberculosis in the United States, for the death rate from that disease is now one half what it was twenty years ago.

"The Oregon Tuberculosis association finances its work almost entirely by the yearly sale of Christmas seals.

"Just how far the Christmas seal will be able to spread its light this year depends on how many seals you and I, and all of us buy and use on holiday letters and packages."—State Board of Health.
