### Editorial Comment

#### CODDLING CRIMINALS.

"More than 100,000 murderers walk the streets today because of idiotic maladministration of the laws," says Dr. Charles F. Aked, in a Chicago address. "The mistaken sympathy of sentimentalists is largely responsible for lawlessness, and it is time some of that sympathy be diverted from the criminal to his victim. At least, the honest man should be given an even break."

Each day the newspapers contain the flotsam and jetsam of the crime wave. Yesterday we find these examples: At Medford, a 3-year-old boy describes the methods by which a modern "Fagin" trains apprentices in crime. A New York woman is robbed of a diamond necklace at a society tea. Yegemen rob the bank at Shoda. In Portland, a lone robber holds up a man on Montana avenue and gets \$80. A report shows that there were 1223 automobiles stolen in Portland during the year. All these are not offenses of impulse, emotion or weakness, but the acts of professional criminals, who make crime a business, and who deserve just so much sympathy as one would give a striking rattlesnake. The number of such items to be found in the news columns shows the flourishing condition of the crime business, and the breakdown of the machinery which should destroy it.

So serious is the situation that Portland banks employ an armored car to transport valuables. New York is putting into service nine such cars, equipped with rifles, shotguns and tear gas bombs, and manned by sharpshooters. Bankers and jewelers further protect themselves by their own detective organizations which, realizing the weakness of the police, depend upon their own operatives to apprehend criminals.

Our government, state and national, is fast drifting into an anomalous position in which it enters many fields formerly occupied by private business, but so neglects its essential duty of protecting life and property that this task must be assumed by private agencies. Dr. Aked is right. It is time that the honest citizen should have a little consideration. It is time to stop coddling the criminals and begin to muzzle the sob-sisters.—Portland Telegram.
