SPRINGFIELD PEOPLE READ MUCH OF FICTION

That Springfield people are great readers is indicated in the fact that the circulation of the public library for 1925 was 12,802, an increase of 400 over last year. These figures are made public in the annual report of Miss Mary Roberts, librarian, completed today.

The average daily circulation of the library is 1772, the smallest daily circulation, 719. The library had 353 new borrowers for the year.

Forty-six new books were added by purchase, and 79 by gift.

Attention is of greatest interest to Springfield readers. Eighty-five per cent of the reading material loaned during the year was of fiction.
