## County Union Will Meet January 22nd

Development of cooperative marketing was traced by Paul V. Maris, director of extension work of Oregon Agriculture college, in the principal address given at the good will dinner of the Lane County Farmers union at the Osburn hotel New Year's day.

After explaining the process of building up cooperative marketing, Mr. Maris said that the biggest problem now is in the study of production and that some method of producing for demand must be developed.

President Ralph Laird of Creswell presided at the dinner. Frank Jenkins, of Eugene, M. H. Rice and A. D. Rice of Salina, Kansas, B. W. Ewing, B. F. Kinney and C. W. Allen were others who spoke. The dinner was in charge of the Lorane local.
