OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

Fire losses in Dallas for 1925 were small, not a single building being destroyed.

Establishment of a rock pile for the employment of county prisoners was advocated at Salem by Brazier Small, justice of the peace.

Appropriations aggregating \$312,500 for the Chemawa Indian school have been included in the interior department appropriation bill.

Oregon and Idaho would be authorized to build a bridge across the Snake river at Ballard's landing site under a bill passed by the senate.

R. L. Stephens, 71, a native of Douglas county, ex-sheriff and for many years one of Roseburg's leading shoe merchants died at Roseburg.

Members of the tax investigating committee created under an act of the 1925 legislature have been summoned to meet in Salem January 25.

Selection of a president of the University of Oregon at Eugene to succeed the late P. L. Campbell probably will be announced within the next few weeks.

Ground breaking for the paper mill of the St. Helens Pulp & Paper company was celebrated at St. Helens by a dedicatory program and a cessation of business.

For the second time in less than a month petitions for the recall of Mayor Fox and Councilmen Silvis, Schilling, Carlson, Well, Njgswonger and Henkle are in circulation at Bend.

The public service commission dismissed the application of the Bear Creek Boom company for a franchise on the waters of Bear creek and its tributaries in Coos county.

Twenty-eight persons met violent death in Multnomah county in December, according to the monthly report prepared by Coroner Smith. Suicide predominated, ten persons ending their lives.

More than 50 colonies of bees in the apiary of John Pashek at The Dalles assumed that spring was here and became active. Some of the bees swarmed, which is unprecedented for January.

Applicants desiring to renew their real estate dealers' licenses for 1926 who do not remit the annual fee by January 10, will be penalized. Will Moore, state real estate commissioner has stated.

During last year 20,635,546 feet of timber was cut in the Cascade national forest, valued at \$34,898,49, according to a report issued at the office in Eugene of Nelson F. Macduff, supervisor.

One hundred and three mills reporting to the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending January 2, manufactured 45,124,659 feet of lumber sold 70,678,270 feet and shipped 69,014,991 feet.

Patrons of the Kilpatrick-Collins Water company, which operates in Multnomah county, filed a protest with the public service commission in connection with the proposal of the company to increase its rates.

The state board of control has accepted the new girls' dormitory recently completed at the state home for the feeble minded at Salm at a cost of \$50,000. The structure has accommodations for approximately 50 patients.

Samuel B. Jackson, under arrest in Michigan, will be returned to Astoria, where he is wanted on a charge of larceny by embezzlement. It was alleged that Jackson obtained approximately \$2500 belonging to George B. Carey of Clatsop county.

There were two fatalities in Oregon due to industrial accidents in the week ending January 7, according to the state industrial accident commission. The victims were Tom Jeray, Rainier, settler, and Toney Strombaugh, Portland, tramcar operator.

More than 150 miles of federal aid roads were completed in Oregon during the fiscal year just closed, with 102 more miles under construction and 39 approved for construction, according to the annual report of the chief of the bureau of public roads.

Plans have been launched by the social committee of the Pendleton Commercial association for the entertainment of sheep men of the state when the 29th annual convention of the Oregon Wool Growers' association is held in Pendleton January 22 and 23.

Portland's death rate for 1925 showed a very slight increase over that of 1924. It is shown by provisional figures issued by the bureau of census from a compilation of weekly health reports. The total for Portland showed 3,349 deaths in 1925 as compared with 3240 in 1924, while the death rate increased from 11.7 to 11.9 a thousand in the same period.

Recommendation that the Oregon delegation in congress be urged to introduce a bill providing for an appropriation of \$4,000,000 for construction of a new federal building in Portland was adopted by the board of directors of the Portland Chamber of Commerce.

J. J. Aldred, eastern representative of Salem's proposed new \$40,000 linen mill, has advised directors of the concern that he is in New York preparing a contract for the purchase of the required spinning machinery. The machinery will cost approximately \$100,000.

Senate investigation of the manner in which affairs of the Klamath irrigation district have been handled by the United States reclamation service is asked by the directors of the Klamath irrigation district in a letter mailed to Oregon representatives in congress.

Mrs. Emma Bryant, county school superintendent of Washington county, was elected president of the Oregon County School Superintendents' association, meeting in Salem. Other officers elected included Mrs. Jennie Cope of Curry county and Mrs. Edna Geer of Linn county.

Brigadier-General Frank T. Hines, chief of the veterans' bureau, has asked Senator McNary to facilitate early transfer to the bureau of the 25-acre tract on the Sam Jackson estate at Portland, offered by the University of Oregon medical school as a possible site for the new veterans' hospital.

December's lumber exports from the Willamette and Columbia river district to Australia reached 18,762,187 feet compared with 6,616,071 feet for the same month in 1924, according to figures compiled. The total for 1925 was 95,510,049 feet, and in 1924 the business amounted to 80,963,735 feet.

A deed was filed in the office of the Clackamas county recorder by Charles G. Fisher and wife to the First Wisconsin Trust company for a large tract of land located in Marion and Clackamas counties, much of which is covered with valuable timber holdings. According to the stamps that appear on the deed the land is valued at \$700,000.

The retting and scutching capacity of the state flax plant at the Oregon state penitentiary will be doubled this year, according to conclusions reached at a conference of persons interested in the success of the industry at Salem. It was decided to continue artificial drying experiments, add a night crew to clean seed and operate state hullers during the present year. Approximately 2500 acres of flax will be contracted for in 1926.

Less than \$5,000 out of an anticipated 240,000 motor vehicles in Oregon had been licensed for 1925 last week. Approximately 3000 licenses are now being issued daily, and if this rate is maintained, virtually all of the applications now in the hands of the secretary of state will have been disposed of by February 1. As soon as the congestion in the motor vehicle department is relieved the police officers of the state will be notified.

State ownership and operation of utilities is proposed by an amendment to the constitution sponsored by the Housewives' Council, Inc. Printed copies of the measure are now being distributed. It is planned to have the state go into the water and power business on a large scale, for the proposed amendment, if adopted by the people, authorizes issuing bonds up to 5 per cent of the assessed value of the state, a matter, roughly, of \$50,000,000.

The population of the several state institutions increased from 4483 on January 1, 1925 to 4639 on January 1, 1926, according to a report prepared for consideration of the state board of control. The population of the several institutions, as set out in the report, follows: State hospital, 1851; penitentiary, 470; feeble minded home, 788; boys' training school, 189; tuberculosis hospital, 153; blind school, 44; deaf school, 119; girls' school, 71; eastern Oregon hospital, 778; soldiers' home, 116; blind school, Portland, 51.

Divorce suits filed in the circuit courts in the state of Oregon during the years 1917 to 1924, inclusive, were twice as numerous as criminal actions filed during the same period, according to a report prepared by a committee headed by Albert Ridgway, secretary of the Oregon judicial council. The report shows that during the eight-year period there were a total of 94,069 cases filed in the circuit courts. Of these 34,537 were classified as law actions, 20,911 equity cases, 27,238 divorce suits and 11,383 criminal actions.

Governor Pierce signed an order authorizing a special election February 16 for the creation of what would be known as the Siskiyou improvement district in southern Oregon. The district would include the western half of Jackson county and the eastern part of Josephine county. The purpose of the district is to construct a road up Williams creek to the Oregon caves. Such a road would cost approximately \$150,000 and would provide an entrance to the caves from the Medford side. The election was authorized under an act of the 1921 legislature.

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
