AN ORDINANCE VACATING SO MUCH OF THIRD STREET NORTH OF "F" STREET AND "G" STREET EAST OF THIRD STREET AS LIES WITHIN THE TOWN OF SPRINGFIELD.

Whereas, C. L. Fandrem, O. F. Anderson, E. W. Walker, The Harry M. Stewart Fuel Co., Inc., and Loud Mfg. Co., owners of the property affected by the vacation of the hereinafter described streets, have petitioned the Common Council of the Town of Springfield, to vacate so much of the hereinafter described streets as lies within the city limits of the Town of Springfield, and

Whereas said petition was duly drawn and signed in compliance with the laws of the State of Oregon, and

Whereas said petition has been filed with the Recorder of the Town of Springfield for thirty days prior to the presentation of this Ordinance, and

OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF-SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

To obtain funds for Pacific college at Newberg a campaign will be launched Thursday to raise \$100,000.

Thirteen men students now are quarantined in the University of Oregon infirmary at Eugene as a result of an epidemic of mumps.

Organization of poultry men of Deschutes county will come up for consideration at a farm marketing conference to be held in Bend Thursday.

The safe in the Southern Pacific station at West Fir, near Oakridge, was blown open and \$200 in cash taken.

Twenty-two persons met violent death in Portland in January, according to an official summary prepared by Coroner Smith.

Reservation of public lands in Coos county as public parks and camp sites was proposed in a bill introduced in the house by Representative Hawley.

Governor Pierce issued a requisition for the return of T. W. Lyle, who is wanted in Harney county on a forgery charge. Lyle was under arrest in Idaho.

William Cole and George Cabel, Columbia county prisoners, escaped from the jail at St. Helens after confederates on the outside had sawed away two bars.

A proposed amendment to the agriculture appropriation bill to allow \$30,000 for drilling wells for stock in the Modoc national forest was introduced by Senator McNary.

Herbert Armstrong, of the Menasha Woodware company, North Bend, was chosen president of the Coos County Fire Patrol association at a meeting in Marshfield.

Under the direction of I. M. C. Anderson, county club agent, a series of meetings of the Boys' and Girls' clubs of Clackamas county are being held in various parts of the county.

The cement block Ferndale school, two miles north of Freewater, was gutted by fire. The building was erected in 1909 and it is estimated could not be replaced for less than \$20,000.

Rhea Luper, state engineer, announced the completion of the adjudication of water rights on Burnt river and its tributaries in Baker county, involving 245 water users and covering 27,425 acres.

The appointment of M. E. Weatherford of Arlington as county judge for Gilliam county was announced by Governor Pierce following receipt of the resignation of L. E. Fowler from that position.

Mother of six children, although only 29 years of age, Mrs. Sylvia L. Fisher, wife of J. W. Fisher, died in a hospital at Bend after she took poison at her ranch house four miles east of that city.

The flax plant at the state penitentiary at Salem will be enlarged in the coming spring in the way of building new, large, concrete retting tanks that will practically double the present capacity.

Sisters, located at the east approach to the scenic McKenzie pass country, prepared for the coming tourist season by organizing the Sisters chamber of commerce. Dr. H. L. Vincent is president of the new organization.

William O. Crosby, known in central Oregon through his work in investigating the water holding possibilities of the Benham Falls storage reservoir site, died recently in Boston. Friends in Bend have been notified.

The city council of McMinnville voted to hold an election on the question of including the college campus in the corporate limits of the city and of voting on the \$50,000 bonds for the \$500,000 building campaign of the college.

Speaking before the Marion-Polk Realtors' association at Salem, Frank Durbin, Marion county dairyman and hop buyer, urged a reduction in taxes for the support of higher learning and advocated additional state aid in the education of farmers.

An ultimatum to all poolrooms in Klamath Falls conducting punchboards and slot machines; to all gambling dives; to all bootlegging resorts, and to all disorderly houses to desist from unlawful activities was delivered by E. L. Elliott, district attorney.

As the first step in a program which contemplates the ultimate purchase by the city of Salem of the present water system, the council appropriated \$3500 to cover the expense of an appraisal of the property of the Salem Water, Light & Power company.

Senator Stanfield invited Governor Pierce to send a representative of Oregon to Washington, D. C., where a joint hearing before the senate and house public lands committees will be held Thursday to consider bills to confirm and quiet public land grants to the states.

Thomas K. Campbell, public service commissioner, has been notified of his appointment to membership on the committee on express and other contract carriers and the special committee on uniform regulatory laws in the National Association of Railway and Utility Commissioners.

Corvallis was chosen as the 1927 meeting place of the Willamette valley district farm loan associations at the conclusion of the convention at Albany. E. T. Reed of Corvallis was named president for the ensuing year and H. G. Rumbaugh of Benton county was re-elected secretary.

Because the county must pay the fine money from arrests made on state highways by its traffic department to the state treasury, in accordance with the recently enacted law to that effect, the Wasco county court decided to economize and get along with but one speed cop in the future.

The public service commission authorized the Mount Hood Loop Railway company to reduce its rates on crude oil hauled from Hood River to Paradise from 21 cents to 14 cents per 100 pounds. The reduction, it was said, will mean a saving of approximately \$55 per tank to the state highway department.

J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction, has distributed to the schools over the state the manual to be used in the observance of Arbor day this year. Schools in counties west of the Cascade mountains observe Arbor day on February 12 and counties east of the Cascades on April 9.

Charles Hall, state senator for Coos and Curry counties, issued a statement in which he announced that he will not enter the republican primaries to seek the nomination for governor. Inability to adjust his business affairs so that he could devote his time to public service is given by Mr. Hall as his reason.

Oregon allotments for pending river and harbor projects are expected to be increased considerably over the figures included in the pending war department appropriation bill as a result of President Coolidge's recent action approving an addition of \$10,000,000 to the \$40,000,000 river and harbor item carried in the bill.

Improvements in several state game commission fish hatcheries in the nature of concrete pond-partitions, new and larger facilities and stronger dams are now under way and will be ready to hold more fish next summer, according to the January report of Mat Ryckman, superintendent of hatcheries for the game commission.

Steps for carrying the fight against the Portland zoning ordinance to the United States supreme court were taken at Salem when Chief Justice McBride of the Oregon supreme court granted a writ of error to Ernest Kroner and Frank Michaels in their suit against the city of Portland, permitting appeal to the higher tribunal.

The Lane county court will be asked to obtain additional right of way on the McKenzie highway from Springfield to Thurston, a distance of five miles, to widen it from 40 feet to 86 feet. Engineers from the state highway commission have been at work on the survey, which will eliminate four sharp turns that now exist in the

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
