Several farmers of the Pleasant Hill district are draining fields with tiling. The ranch of C. F. Hyde where tile was laid last year under the supervision of the Oregon Agricultural college is showing fine results from the draining. Workmen who have been digging post holes on the Hyde ranch the past week report that they struck no water when in the drained sections but were obliged to dig in the mud where no tiling had been laid.

Visitors from the east have been thankful they have escaped some of the severe storms experienced in their former homes. In one instance a letter was received reporting a gale that blew 84 miles an hour for 10 minutes and 60 miles an hour for several hours.

**FARM POINTERS**

Demand for seed flax in Oregon is greater than the supply, the experiment station reports. The tariff of 40 cents a bushel on flax seed is protecting the growers against foreign competition. Where freight rates are high there is a big advantage in growing seed flax in preference to the fibre variety.

Experiments with flax seed production in Oregon are being carried on at the Union station, the Moro station. Results at the Union station have been favorable for many years, and the station is now recommending its growth. Results at the Moro station are not yet satisfactory enough to warrant recommendation in that section. Late plantings in previous years have had had serious losses from heat canker. With early planting last year much better results were obtained. Corvallis station results correspond with those of the Moro station and many other stations in the northwest.

Field peas are a good spring-planted forage crop for both eastern and western Oregon. When planted with beardless barley or oats on some of the cool irrigated projects field peas do particularly well, the experiment station reports. In the Willamette valley, for those desiring a leguminous forage that may be on some of the soils too sour for vetch, peas and oats have given good results when planted in March, April or even in early May.

Ladina clover seed growing in some of the eastern Oregon irrigated sections promises to be a good industry for those interested. Ladina clover is the giant form of white clover that has come here from northern Italy. It is intermediate between white clover

and alsike clover, and has the perennial habit of white clover. Experiment station trials have proved it very productive for pasture in the coast district, in the Willamette valley, and in eastern Oregon irrigated sections in Crook, Lake and Malheur counties. Good seed yields have been secured in both Crook and Lake counties. The seed price is high and the demand good. Results show that it succeeds best on land that is free of common white clover and alsike clover.

**FARMERS WAREHOUSE STOCKHOLDERS MEET**

Total sales of \$387,848.17 during 1925 proved a record business for the Lane County Farmers Union Warehouse company, Manager E. E. Morrison stated in his annual report to the stockholders in session at the Eugene Chamber of Commerce yesterday.

New directors named were: George M. Kebbebeck of Cottage Grove and C. E. Wright of Walker. The directors elects Ralph P. Laird of Pleasant Hill as president and C. E. Jordan of the same place secretary and treasurer. Increase of the capital stock from \$15,000 to \$30,000 was voted.
