OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

The Old Oregon Trail association held its annual meeting in Baker Tuesday.

Teachers of Hood River county attended the second institute of the year at Hood River.

Total taxes in Marion county for the year 1926 are \$1,896,966.17 as against \$1,817,765.14 for the year 1925.

With the Boardman school closed because of a smallpox scare, there is now an epidemic of mumps with 10 cases already reported.

Thomas Meckless of Portland has accepted a position as auditor for the Oregon public service commission. He will succeed B. B. Fenwick, who resigned.

Delegates from nearly every Episcopal parish in eastern Oregon attended the convocation held at St. Peter's church in La Grande Saturday and Sunday.

Early spring gardens within the city limits of Ashland were badly damaged by a band of deer which wandered down from the mountains seeking food and salt.

The annual conference of the Young Women's Christian associations of the smaller colleges of Oregon was held at Pacific University in Forest Grove Saturday and Sunday.

George F. Baker, 51, dry-shed foreman for the Silver Falls Timber company at Silverton, was hurt fatally at the company's mill when he was run down by a lumber carrier.

Harold Gunderson, 20, was struck on the head by a falling tree branch near the Jomard & Gunderson mill at Sandy, and fatally injured. His skull was fractured by the blow.

Fire of undetermined origin, breaking out in the interior of the plant of the American Bedding company in Portland, gutted the building and did damage estimated at \$35,000.

The body of Andrew Bystrom of North Bend was found floating in Caching inlet, several miles from the city. Bystrom disappeared January 7 after a protracted drinking spree.

Oregon ranks fifth among states of the union in per capita income of its farm population, with an average of \$630, according to data compiled by the national bureau of economic research.

Strawberry growers of the Grants Pass irrigation district will be given financial aid by local banks, in an effort to increase berry plantings within the district to several hundred acres this spring.

Diamond lake and the land abutting it would be ceded to the state of Oregon for fish cultural purposes by the federal government under the terms of a bill introduced in the senate by Senator Stanfield.

Work of tearing down the old Albany bridge will be started immediately. This work had been held up pending disposition by the state supreme court of the injunction involving the new bridge.

Assurance that a pickle factory will be established at Silverton next year, providing growers sign up sufficient acreage, was given by J. L. Stafford, state manager for the Oregon Pickle & Canning company.

The old Salem hotel, which was established at Salem in 1864, is to be torn down to make room for a more modern structure, according to announcement made by Frank Bligh, owner of the property.

Reports were received at Salem that the board of education of the Methodist church, holding its annual meeting in Chicago, had approved officially the proposal to move Kimball college of theology from Salem to Seattle.

The county bridge about two miles south of McKay dam in Umatilla county will be moved upstream to the south about a mile. The present site of the bridge and a part of the road will be under water when McKay reservoir fills.

Prospects are excellent that Pilot Rock area farmers will have ten carloads of fat dressed turkeys to ship to market this fall if the season proves as satisfactory for brooding and maturing the birds as it has been for wintering them.

A new February record was set at Ashland Friday when 39 non-resident automobiles were registered at the chamber of commerce. Heretofore 15 has been the highest number of such cars registered in any one day in February.

At an open meeting of the North Bend city council Chief of Police Frank R. Jackson was dismissed from the service of the city for conduct unbecoming an officer. Complaint that Mr. Jackson had been supplying women with liquor from the supply stored in the city jail was made by R. P. Lowry.

Lute Savage, veteran guard, who was shot below the heart during a break at the Oregon state penitentiary August 12, was dismissed from a hospital at Salem, where he has been since. Physicians said he probably would recover.

Mayor Wright and W. S. Link, members of the McMinnville water and light commission, are in Los Angeles to inspect several plants to gain information before the installation of a 500-horsepower engine in the municipal plant at McMinnville.

Dr. Harry Woodburn Chase, nationally known educator and president of the University of North Carolina, was selected unanimously by the board of regents to be the successor of Prince Lucien Campbell, late president of the University of Oregon at Eugene.

A petition signed by 74 property owners was presented to the La Grande city commission requesting that a charter amendment be voted upon at the coming special municipal election to increase the number of city commissioners from three to five.

Organization of the Southern Oregon Peace Officers' association was perfected at a gathering of sheriffs, police chiefs, prohibition officers and traffic officers of southern Oregon at Ashland. Approximately 50 officers from various counties were in attendance.

Sixty patients from the Oregon hospital for insane at Salem were transferred to the Pendleton hospital to relieve the congestion in the main institution. The population of the Salem institution now numbers 1904, of which number 1221 are men and 683 women.

Carl H. Bjorquist of Marshfield, senior in electrical engineering, and Noah H. Trux of Klamath Falls, sophomore in electrical engineering, have been selected by a representative of Westinghouse Electric company to take a student course with the company at Pittsburg, Pa.

Jack Meehan of San Francisco, representing financial interests of that city, has taken a lease with option to buy on the Eagle and Independent black sand mines at Bullards, three miles north of Bandon, and has \$10,000 with which to make a thorough prospect of the property.

Convicts in the Oregon state penitentiary who fail to yield to discipline, either through incarceration in the "bull pen" or elimination of prison privileges, will be compelled to wear uniforms of striped materials, according to an ultimatum issued by J. W. Lillie, warden of the institution.

The two months' old baby of Mr. and Mrs. John Goetjen of Portland was injured fatally, two women suffered serious injuries and the driver was badly bruised when a Portland-Tillamook passenger stage left the road and rolled down the mountain about seven miles south of Neskevin.

Physicians attending ex-Senator George E. Chamberlain in Washington, D. C., reported their patient vastly improved and no alarm is now felt over his condition. His recovery will be slightly hampered by his advanced age and it is expected that a rest of some duration will be prescribed when he leaves his sick bed.

The Owen-Oregon Lumber company announced that it would start work within the next 10 days upon construction of a \$500,000 sawmill in Medford. The new mill will be 90x288 feet in dimension, electrically operated throughout and modernly equipped, with a capacity of cutting 327,000 feet of lumber in a 16-hour shift.

The bill providing for transfer of the Bull Run watershed to the city of Portland by the federal government was introduced in the senate Tuesday by Senator Stanfield. The transfer is recommended by the public lands committee of the senate as the result of a hearing held at Portland last August by a sub-committee taking testimony on the proposed grazing bill.

The number of predatory animals in Oregon was lessened by more than 200 by the work of government poisoners and trappers last month, according to the monthly report of predatory animal killings released by the United States bureau of biological survey. Nearly 50 men worked all or part time during the month. Coyotes to the number of 201 were destroyed during the month by the hunters, as well as 18 bobcats, 1 raccoon, 2 skunks, 5 bobbers and 35 porcupines.
