A Proclamation

WHEREAS, the timber industry is one of the chief sources of prosperity for this community, and the forests of the surrounding country are an asset of untold value, not only from the industrial and commercial point of view but as a means of preservation of wild life, as attractions to visiting tourists, as a playground for the people, and in countless other ways, and

WHEREAS, the preservation of this important natural resource depends almost wholly upon the interest of the public in protection of the forests from the ravages of fire in reforestation of the areas where the timber has been cut, and in forest conservation, and

WHEREAS, the week begining April 18 and ending April 24 has been set aside by the United States Department of Agriculture as National Forest Week, a time for the centering of public interest on the important problems of

THEREFORE, I hereby proclaim the week of April 18 as Forestry Week in Springfield and do hereby urge that every effort be made by the people of this community to appropriately observe this period; that local merchants, the school authorities, the church pastors, and the clubs and civic organizations, follow the suggestions of the state and local chamber of commerce in planning suitable means of bringing this important matter to public attention.
