Supervisors in Pest War Are Named

Appointments Made By Lane County Court For 22 Districts; To Lead Campaign For Control of Squirrels and Pests In Section

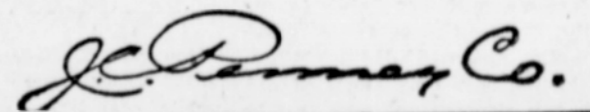
