Lane Farmers Union in Session Today

Public Meeting To Be Held At 1:30 This Afternoon With Political Speeches Main Feature; Committee Gives Report On Candidates

Delegates from locals of the Lane County Farmers union arrived in Springfield this morning and went into session at 10 o'clock at the Woodmen of the World hall in the first quarterly meeting of the year. Political issues constitute the most important features of the session today, and at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon the doors will be open to the public and a meeting featuring addresses by candidates for primary nominations will be held.

The morning's session was taken up for the most part by reports from committees and other Farmers union business, with C. W. Allen of Vida, the president, in charge.

In the afternoon, I. L. Patterson,

candidate for republican nomination for governor; Willard Elkins, candidate for the state senate; L. Toozie, who is seeking the state superintendency of public instruction, S. S. George, candidate for the legislature, and others will speak. Another feature of the afternoon session will be a talk on cooperation given by W. M. Wilson, of the Brotherhood bank of Portland.

Political Issues.

The report of the union's political committee urges support by the union to the income tax bill submitted by the grange and the Farmer's union, and of the one mill tax for the fairgrounds. It also urges careful study of the Hydro-electric bill.

The committee has also adopted a ticket and recommended it to the union for approval today. As the union is non-partisan, both republican and democratic candidates are approved in the report, which follows:

COW TESTING ASSOCIATION CAMPAIGN NOW UNDER WAY

A drive to sign up 600 head of dairy cattle in a cow testing association is now under way. N. C. Jamison, extension dairy specialist of Oregon Agricultural college, and O. C. Fletcher, county agent, are assisting farmers getting the work started in the various districts. Already 10 herds consisting of 222 cows have been signed up.

The cow testing association work carried on extensively in other counties has not been in practice here with the exception of western Lane county which one time belonged to the Umpqua association.

PREPARING PLANS FOR DRAINAGE DISTRICT

Work on the Croswell drainage project is under way this week with F. E. Powers, extension drainage engineer of O. A. C., here assisting with the driving of a property way and the circulation of the petition among property owners. Nearly 1000 acres is expected to be taken into the project which would take care of the flood waters of Linn hollow.

The law provides when half the property holders sign a petition for a drainage district the county court will hold a hearing on whether the district should be formed or not. C. L. Gaine and W. E. Quinn, are the property owners committee, pushing the plans for a drainage district.

I. L. PATTERSON VISITS IN SPRINGFIELD TODAY

I. L. Patterson, republican candidate for nomination for governor, is a visitor in Springfield today, and this afternoon will be heard in a talk given at a public meeting at the Woodmen of the World hall under the auspices of the Lane County Farmers union.

Mr. Patterson is a resident of Eola, Polk county, where he has a large farm. He is running for the gubernatorial nomination on a platform embodying law enforcement features, tax reduction, conservatism in road construction with a hastening of the Roosevelt highway building, supervision of the state penitentiary under a board of control with fewer pardons, and other features.
