JUNCTION NOT LIKELY TO GET BUS SERVICE

Only the delayed arrival of another bus is preventing the establishment of through bus service between Springfield and Eugene, A. S. Billingsley, superintendent of street railways in Eugene for the Southern Pacific company, said on a visit to Springfield Tuesday. Mr. Billingsley said that it is hoped that additional busses will be here within a fortnight.

Bus or street car service for Springfield Junction is doubtful, according to intimations made by the street railway chief. It would be altogether impracticable, he said, to attempt to run the busses over the rough roads into Springfield Junction for the comparatively small business which a careful check of passengers has roven to be given the company at Springfield Junction. The road from Springfield Junction straight to the highway, he said, is even rougher than that over which the busses are now traveling between Glenwood and the Junction. On the other hand, he said, service along the highway will be of a benefit to a great many more people than it is through Springfield Junction.

Both city and county have worked on the highway to make bus travel more comfortable this week. The city has scarified Second avenue to the approach to the bridge, while the county has improved the surface of the stretch between the bridge and the paved highway.
