LITTLE UNEMPLOYMENT FOUND ON WEST COAST

Berry Pickers in Demand—Building Construction Active—More Highway Work Started—Logging Slower

Portland, June 10.—(Special.) Berry pickers are in heavy demand throughout the fruit districts of western Oregon and Washington, and last week growers were advertising for large numbers of workers, according to the 4L employment letter published here today. Prices for picking are slightly higher than those of last year, the letter said.

Fir logging, however, is not so active as it was two months ago. During the past ten days a few large camps have been closed down and sides aid off at several others. Lumber manufacturing in the fir districts is also at a lower level than it was in April, night shifts having been laid off at many operations. Announcements made last week by some concerns point to a possible repair shut-down earlier than usual.

There appears to be no let-up of building and construction activity, the 4L letter stated. All towns and cities report a large amount of this work being done, and men in the building trades are well employed. The strike in some of the trades at Aberdeen and Hoquiam, Washington, was brought to a close late last week and after nearly four weeks of inactivity, work has been resumed.
