His career in business has been marked by a strong personal interest in the welfare of his employees. Mr. Ford was the first to use profit-sharing principles in his great plants.

**DETAIL OF HENRY FORD'S LIFE AND WORK**

Henry Ford, automobile manufacturer; born Greensburg, Mich., July 30, 1863; Learned machanic's trade; Lived in Detroit since 1887; Was chief engineer Edison Illuminating Co. Organizer, 1903, and president of Ford Motor Co. (largest manufacturers of automobiles in the world, employing over 75,000 persons; turn out about 3,500 automobiles a day). Announced January 1914 plan of profit-sharing involving distribution of ten to thirty million of dollars annually to employees.

Member Society of Automotive Engineers and Detroit Board of Commerce. Belongs to the following clubs, Detroit Bankers, Detroit Athletic, Fellowcraft, Bloomfield Hills Country, Detroit Golf, Detroit Boat, Wolverine Auto and Automobile of America.

Maintains corps of social workers to look after welfare of employees and families, also legal and medical departments free of charge; School for teaching English language; Built Henry Ford Hospital at cost of \$5,000,000. Appointed by President Wilson member of Wage Umpire Board, July 13, 1918; Democratic candidate for U. S. Senate against Truman H. Newberry, 1918. Address: Dearborn, Michigan.
