The Tillamook city water commission has filed with the state engineer application for permission to appropriate water from Fawcett creek, for municipal supply, and for storage of 200,000 gallons of water at an estimated cost of \$35,000.

The federal power commission has authorized the issuance of a preliminary permit for two years to 'the Prairie Power company of Prairie City for a proposed project on Strawberry creek in Grant county, with 1000 horsepower capacity.
