The fair will be an exclusive club affair at which the club members will show the results of their summers work and will give demonstrations of their work. There is no admission charge.

Ten clubs from the Coburg vicinity will have exhibits. There will be a corn, potatoe, mint, poultry, turkey, calf, sheep, sewing, cooking and camp cooking club present with demonstrations of the work by some of them and stock judging by the others. H. C. ## Recommends Copper Carbonate

The copper carbonate dust treatment for the control of smut in wheat is recommended by County Agent O. S. Fletcher, who says it is being used almost universally in the large wheat growing districts instead of blue stone treatment. Two ounces of copper carbonate to the bushel is being used. Specifications for a home-made mixer are on file at the county agent's office.

## Drainage District May Be Formed
