

ORDINANCE NUMBER 507
AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE for the issuance of Town of Springfield Fire Engine General Obligation Bonds in the sum of \$7000.00; to provide a form for said bonds and the coupons attached thereto; directing the Town Recorder to publish a call for bids for said bonds and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, heretofore at an election duly called and held in the Town of Springfield on the 27th day of July, 1926, the legal voters of the Town of Springfield authorized the Common Council to issue general obligation bonds of said town in a sum not exceeding \$7,500.00 in 500.00 denominations, to mature five years after date bearing 6 per cent interest per annum, with which to purchase a fire engine and apparatus for the same, and

WHEREAS, It now becomes necessary to provide for the issuance thereof, now therefore,

THE TOWN OF SPRINGFIELD DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the Town of Springfield do issue its bonds in the sum of Seven Thousand (\$7000.00) dollars, said bonds to be in denominations of Five Hundred dollars (\$500.00) each, to be numbered 1 to 14, to be dated as agreed upon by the town and the purchaser and to mature five years after date, to bear interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, principal and interest to be payable in United States Gold Coin of the present standard value at the fiscal agency of the State of Oregon in New York City, said bonds to be signed by the mayor and countersigned by the Recorder under the corporate seal of said town, and the interest on said bonds to be represented by semi-annual interest coupons attached thereto bearing the engraved facsimile signatures of said Mayor and Recorder, which said bonds shall be known as "Town of Springfield Fire Engine General Obligation Bonds."

Section 2. That the said Town of Springfield Fire Engine General Obligation Bonds and the coupons attached thereto shall be in substantially the following form:

 TOWN OF SPRINGFIELD, LANE COUNTY, OREGON, for value received, hereby promises to pay to bearer the sum of FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS on the _____ day of _____, 19____, with interest thereon from date hereof at the rate of six per cent (6%) per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of _____ and _____ to the bearer of the respective coupons therefor hereto attached as they mature, both principal and interest, payable in United States Gold Coin of the present standard of value at the fiscal agency of the State of Oregon in New York City.

This bond is one of a series aggregating \$7000.00 par value in amount, authorized and issued under and pursuant to a vote of the legal voters of the town of Springfield at an election duly called and held therein on the 27th day of July, 1926, said series of bonds being issued for the purpose of procuring funds with which to purchase a fire engine and apparatus for said town.

And it is hereby certified that every requirement of law relating to the issue thereof has been duly complied with and that this bond is within every debt and other limit prescribed by the constitution and laws of the State of Oregon or the charter of said town.

And for the punctual payment of the principal hereof and the interest hereon the full faith and credit of the town of Springfield is hereby irrevocably pledged.

Section 3. The Town Recorder shall cause a notice to be published for a period of two weeks in a weekly newspaper published in the town of Springfield, Lane County, Oregon, which notice shall call for bids for the purchase of said bonds and shall state that the Common Council of the Town of Springfield, Oregon, will meet at the hour of 7-30 P. M. on the 11th day of October, 1926, at the Council Chambers of the town of Springfield to open and consider such bids; said notice shall state that the Common

Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids and that each bid shall be accompanied by a certified check in the amount of 2 per cent of the price bid as an evidence of good faith on the part of the bidder.

Section 4. WHEREAS, the bonds hereinabove provided for were duly authorized at an election regularly held for that purpose; and

WHEREAS, It is necessary that funds be procured at as early date as possible for the purpose for which said bonds were authorized, thereby involving the peace, health and safety of the town, and in order to do so, it is necessary to enact this ordinance now, therefore,
AN EMERGENCY is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall go into force and effect upon its adoption and approval.

Passed by the council this 13th day of September, 1926, by the following vote. YEAS: Three, NAYS: none. Submitted to the Mayor September 13, 1926.
