TUNING FIRE WHISTLE CAUSES DISTURBANCE

Where there is smoke there is fire might be changed to read, "When the fire whistle blows there is a fire" if one judged by the actions of Springfield people Monday afternoon when they heard the fire siren blowing at the Mountain States Power plant. Many people were alarmed at the noise although no ward signal was blown and thought that the absence of a ward signal only meant a bigger fire.

All their worry was in vain, for there was no fire. The men in charge of the Springfield alarm system at the power plant were only adjusting the whistle as they were not satisfied with the quality of sound emitted by the whistle, or with its volume.

In tuning the whistle it was necessary to use an acetylene blow pipe to loosen the whistle so it could be changed. The whistle had never been adjusted since it had been installed and it had rusted together. All this work took some time and caused the whistle to blow long and loud making many people think there was a fire.

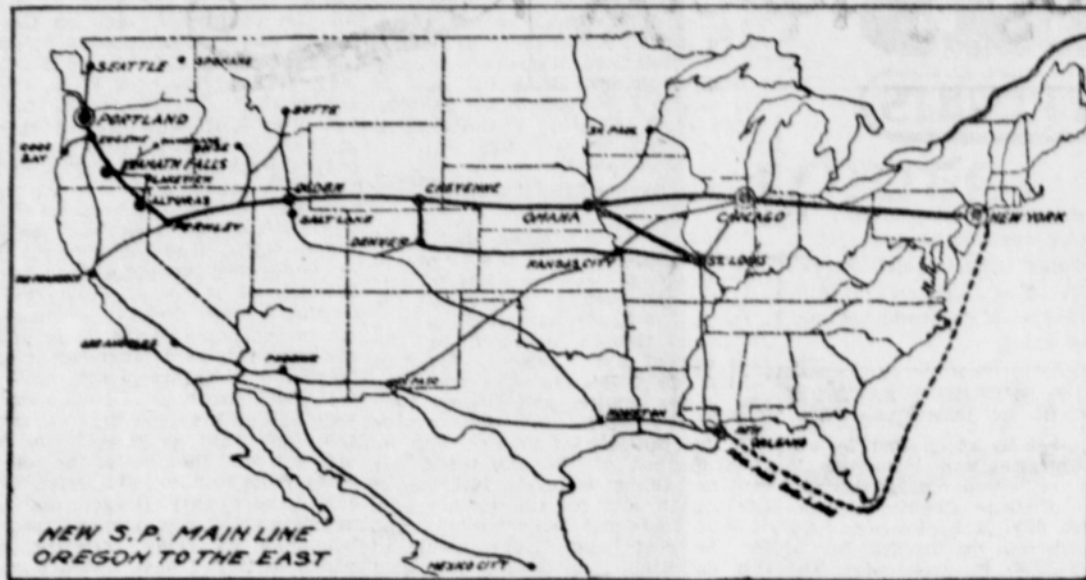

BOX PLAITS

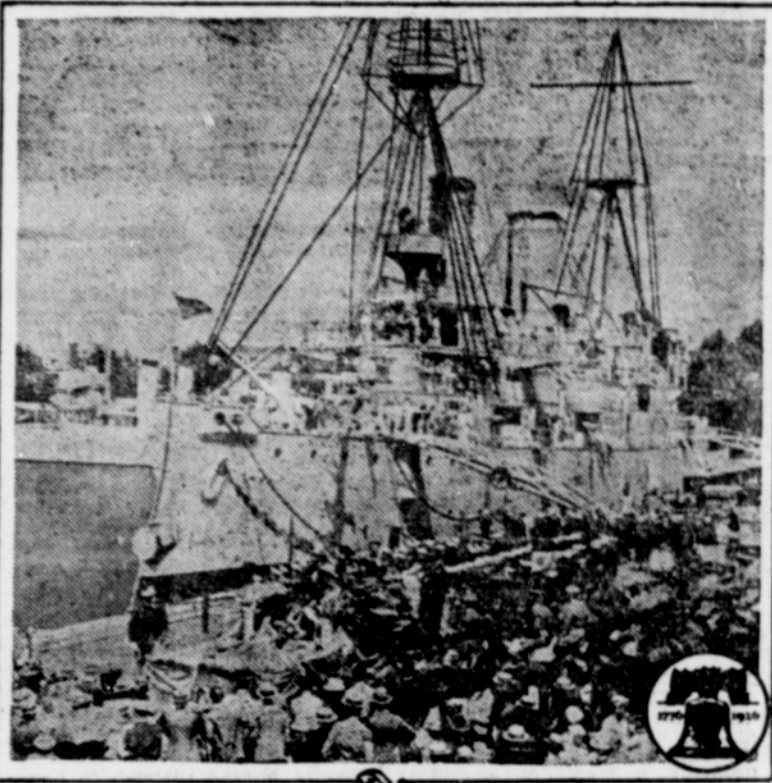
An exceptionally smart effect is gained by the Jenny model I have sketched here at the left. In this dress pairs of the box plaits are held together near the bottom of the skirt with narrow bands of fat cord. As shown at A, this makes a very attractive plait. The plait is made of two pairs of box plaits as left. As shown at B, and decorative treatment of the plaits is shown by the heavy silk crepe frack at the right. Here the plaits are arranged in points at the top. To do this lay the plaits in the usual way as shown at B. Cut the tops into points as at C. Then slash down about a half inch between the plaits as shown at D. Turn under the raw edges as at E and the skirt portion is ready to be applied to the upper portion of the dress.

Mailing List To Be Revised—F. B. Hamlin, local postmaster is in receipt of a letter advising all mailers to have their mailing lists revised. This can be done by sending them in to the post office who will make all necessary corrections and bring them up to date. The postmaster can not

furnish mailing lists but he can remove names of those who have died, moved away, or make corrections in spelling or initials.

Fined Two Dollars—G. H. Turne was fined \$2 this morning for allowing his engine to run unattended.

The second move of the Oregon prohibition referendum corporation for the quashing of existing prohibition laws, this time applying directly to Oregon, was made in Salem when a proposed initiative measure was filed with the secretary of state last week for the repeal of the prohibition amendment of the state constitution and all the Oregon prohibition statutes. If the initiative petitions are successfully circulated the measure is to be voted on in the general election of 1928.

All hatching eggs, baby chicks, growing and brooding stock, transported or otherwise moved into the state of Oregon after August 1, 1927, must be accompanied by an official health certificate showing that they came from parent stock which was found to be free of bacillary white diarrhoea by the application of the agglutination test within 12 months immediately prior to the time of their transportation, according to the terms of a proclamation issued by Governor Pierce.

Formal declaration of the quarantine prohibiting interstate movement of white or five-leafed pine from seven Oregon counties and the entire state of Washington to prevent the spread of blister rust has been signed by the acting secretary of agriculture. It was announced. The restrictions will become effective on October 1. The seven Oregon counties affected are Clatsop, Columbia, Lincoln, Polk, Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill. The new orders will not only bar any shipment of white pine from that area but will require a federal permit from the federal horticultural board at Washington for interstate movement of currant and gooseberry plants.

Goodman Released—The case against J. Goodman for vagrancy has been dismissed by the district attorney for lack of evidence. At his

trial here last week, the jury disagreed. Mr. Goodman was to have been tried again Monday.

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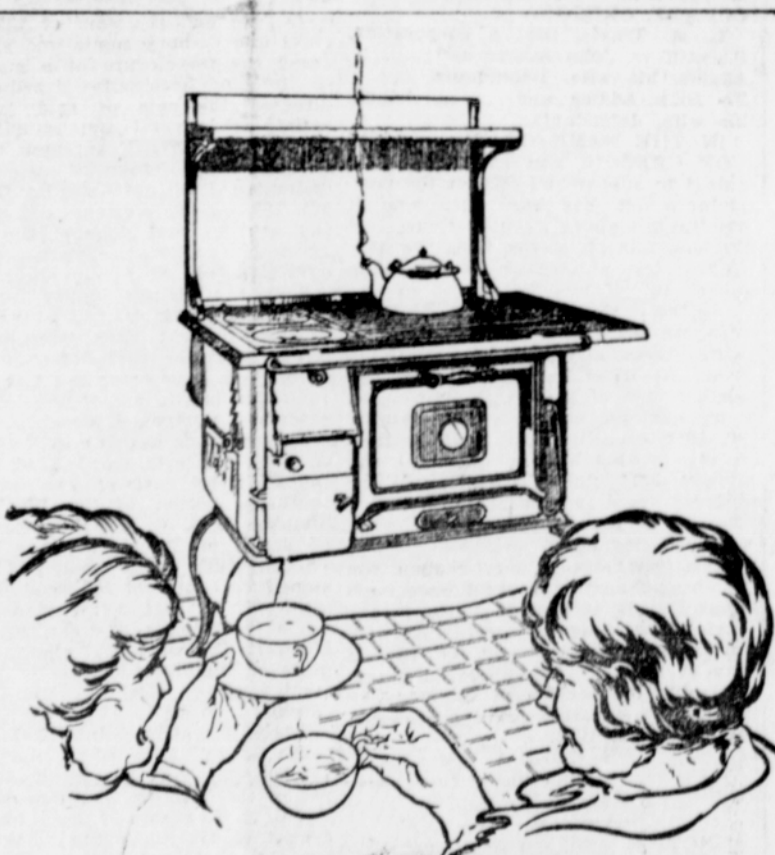
