## COMMITTEE PLANS BRIDGE BOND DRIVE

Convinced that a vigorous county-wide campaign must be waged in behalf of the Springfield bridge bond issue proposition which will be on the ballot at the November 2 election, members of the bridge publicity committee of the Chamber of Commerce and Lions club last night decided to ask the similar committee of the Eugene Chamber to join with them in planning the publicity drive.

A joint meeting of the two committees will be conducted at an early date, at which time final arrangements for the campaign will be shaped. Several suggestions as to methods of giving the issue favorable publicity have been submitted, and others will be asked of the Eugene committeemen.

The issue will be No. 500 on the ballot. This number, it has been pointed out, will lend itself well to publicity placards, and it has been suggested that automobile owners throughout the county be supplied with placards bearing the following: Vote 500 X, or a similar inscription.

As less than four weeks remain for the campaign, no time is to be lost by the committeemen in pushing the drive in behalf of the bond issue, it was said at the meeting. The proposition calls for \$75,000 in bonds, to match a similar appropriation by the state for building a \$150,000 span across the Willamette river here.

The large number of signers to the petition placing the bridge issue on the ballot and the favor given it by the County Court are seen as indications of its probable success in the election. In waging the campaign, the committee plans to put the matter especially before persons living in parts of the county which do not make it necessary for them to cross the antiquated structure which now trembles nervously under the Springfield-Eugene traffic.

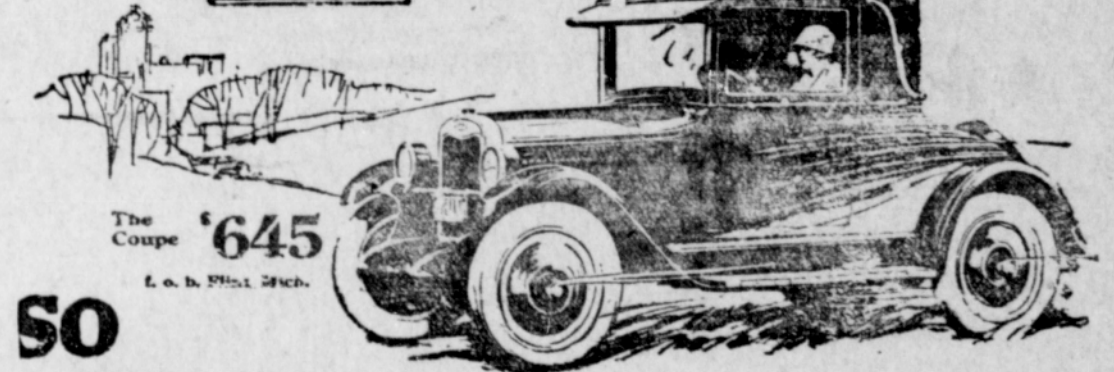
