THE WILLAMETTE ROAD BONDS

The so-called saviors of the Lane county O. & C. Land Grant money say we should issue and buy the proposed Willamette road bonds from this fund. That isn't applying it on the county's indebtedness, as these people would have us believe. It's spending the money on a new project.

As badly as we need a new road to Oakridge it is utter foolishness to issue the bonds, allotted to it in the county bonding scheme, until there exists an arrangement with the state and bureau of public roads to complete this highway. That was the intent of the bonding scheme and the way it should be done.

No agreement exists with the state and federal government looking toward the completion of this road and there is no immediate prospect that there will be one. These bonds should not be issued let alone bought with the county's money until this agreement exists. No county court would think of starting a road under these conditions. The money available from the bonds will not begin to build this expensive highway.

This agitation to spend the money on the Willamette road bonds is a fair sample of the knowledge that these self appointed saviors of the O. & C. money have of the affair of Lane county. They are making a mountain out of a mole hill for the sake of an issue.

DEMOGAGUISM AT HOME

This eleventh hour attempt to knife Commissioner O. E. Crowe on a forged issue that he is for spending the O. & C. Land grant refund money promiscuously is the worst sort of demagoguism that has been practiced in Lane county politics for some time. It is an attempt to muster the rabble by selfish interests in Eugene to gain control of the county court.

Mr. Crowe believes the O. & C. money should be used to retire outstanding road bonds so far as it can be done. He says he recognizes the merits of most of the proposals for handling the O. & C. money. In effect he stands for just what these knifing say they stand for.

But, Mr. Crowe refuses to be brow beaten by any newspaper or make visionray pre-election promises to this self appointed clique, concerning the use of money the county has not received.

We admire Mr. Crowe's courage. He told these people where to go. And Lane county would be better off if they were there.

COMMISSIONER CROWE

The eleventh hour attempt of certain interests in Eugene to bring out a candidate against Commissioner O. E. Crowe is not for the best interests of the county.

Commissioner Crowe has made good. Without disparagement as to qualification of the candidate whom Eugene would put forward for Mr. Crowe's place, the present commissioner has made good in as full a sense as the proposed independent candidate could hope to. To defeat Crowe on the grounds of inefficiency would only invite criticism for his successor, who would find it impossible

to do better. South Lane has been given a square deal by Commissioner Crowe. Under him it has gotten its fair share of county money. South Lane does not care for a change, and it does not believe the Eugene interests behind the candidacy of Mr. Cappernoll have fully stated the issue when they offer as an excuse for the Cappernoll candidacy the refusal of Commissioner Crowe to say how he is going to spend the O. & C. land grant money when it arrives.

Commissioner Crowe can be depended on to use for reduction of taxes as much of this money as is not required for projects which will be designated as necessary by many of those who may be behind the efforts to get the name of an independent upon the ballot.

This eleventh hour effort is showing poor appreciation of honest effort by an honest county official who has worked conscientiously for his county at a wage which is less than that paid many in private positions who have but a small part of the responsibilities of a county commissioner.

We grant that Commissioner Crowe has made errors. We should not care to support him if we thought he were the kind of a man who couldn't make mistakes. Some few things we might have done differently, but on the whole he has been a satisfactory commissioner, and a much better one than we are likely to get by an eleventh hour effort to displace him.

The humane race has experimented a good many hundred years with various kinds of affinities, and it is selective affinity that has stood the test.

It is that which every young man or woman feels with the advent of the right mate. There is something about it that excludes all other affections.

It is not enough to ask yourself whether you are affectionate or not. It is also necessary to inquire of yourself whether this affection is confined to one person. It is not any sort of love that is the basis of the right marriage, but it is loyal love, and the more loyal one is, the greater his love becomes.

There is the same difference between true love and other kinds of love that there is between a flower and weeds. One is a cultivated plant, and it is that for which the garden was made. The other is an interloper and does nothing but drain our resources.

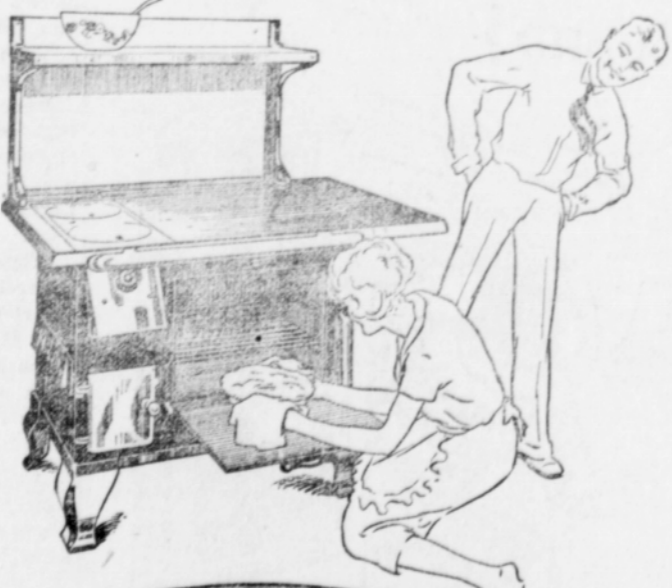
