OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

The Willamette valley typographical conference met in Eugene Sunday.

The Washington County Christian Endeavor union held its annual convention at Gaston.

Mrs. Carrie McNutt, 73, was killed at The Dalles when struck by an automobile driven by C. E. Silbaugh of Burns.

The fall meeting of the southern Oregon presbytery of the Presbyterian church was held at Malin in Klamath county.

The assessed value of Yamhill county is \$20,688,640 for 1926 according to figures compiled by Martin Miller, county assessor.

A check among growers of all parts of the Hood River valley reveals that the toll of the past week's drop of apples will reach 200,000 boxes.

The entire townsite of Westlake, on Siltecoos lake in the western part of Lane county, will be sold November 13 on account of delinquent taxes.

The Eugene school enrollment is growing every week and the total is now more than 3600, according to David John Jones, city superintendent.

William Henry Gray hall, first unit of the new Albany college plant at Albany, was dedicated before a large audience of students, alumni and friends.

Seventy thousand people visited the Cascade national forest during the past summer, according to an estimate made by Nelson F. Macduff, supervisor of the forest.

An unidentified man about 45 years old committed suicide by throwing himself in front of the McMinnville stage, one mile west of Salem, on the Salem-Dallas highway.

The construction of a new \$300,000 hotel at Baker, is definitely assured, depending only upon the subscription of about \$15,000 by Baker people for the purchase of the site.

The 16th annual district Odd Fellows' convention was held in The Dalles with 400 members of the order from Wasco, Sherman, and Hood River counties attending.

Mrs. Johanna Packwood, 84, early resident of Oregon and widow of the late William H. Packwood of Baker, died in Salem at the home of her daughter, Mrs. John L. Rand.

Linn county republicans increased their percentage of the total registration from 59.9 per cent in 1924 to 63.7 in 1926, according to figures compiled by R. M. Russell, county clerk.

The public service commission has approved the application of the California & Oregon Lumber company for permission to discontinue its electric service at Brookings, Curry county.

W. B. Riley, well-known stockman of McEwen, now at Russell, Kan., has purchased 80 head of the best purebred Angus cattle he could find in the state. They will be shipped to Oregon.

Ralph Schneeloch & Co. of Portland purchased world war veterans state aid bonds in the amount of \$2,000,000. The bonds were sold on a basis of 4.2784 per cent. There were 10 bidders.

A record was established for the Crater national forest during the season past when 84,770 persons entered its boundaries en route to various parts of the forest and Crater lake national park.

Linn county's assessment roll for 1926, exclusive of public utilities, is \$26,114,670, according to figures made public by Grant Froman, assessor. This is a slight decrease from the 1925 assessment.

Sam A. Kozar, secretary of state, sent a writ to the sheriff of Klamath county fixing November 2 as the date for holding the recall election involving A. L. Leavitt, circuit judge of the 13th judicial district.

Mrs. Emma Cole, 70, of Jefferson, was killed when an automobile in which she was riding collided with a car driven by Mrs. G. W. Brown of Reedley, Cal., on the Pacific highway, eight miles south of Salem.

The walnut growers of Sheridan are hoping for clear weather. They have now harvested about half of their bumper crop, but if rainy weather continues they are afraid they will lose the rest of their walnuts.

Lena Maud Johnson, 11-year-old school girl of the Summerville district of Union county, was so seriously injured when she fell beneath the feet of a galloping horse she was riding that she died half an hour later.

The huge Owyhee reclamation project, which will render productive 124,000 acres of arid land in Oregon and Idaho, became a reality with announcement from the White House that President Coolidge had approved a report from Secretary of Interior Work recommending its construction.

C. L. Jamison of Baker has been engaged as orderly marketing director by the Oregon Cattle and Horse Raisers' association, it was learned, following a meeting of Baker, Union and Willamette stockmen at La Grande.

Protection of fish in Oregon streams from power and irrigation water intakes is the responsibility of the parties who put in the intakes, in the opinion of the fish commission of Oregon, as stated by E. I. Ballagh, master fish warden.

Invitations for the hangings of James Willos and Ellsworth Kelley, which have been set for November 5, will be limited to prison officials, clergy, physicians and newspaper men, according to Warden Lillie of the state penitentiary.

J. A. Yaden, 75, of Kelso, Wash., took a bouquet of fresh flowers to the grave of his wife in a cemetery at The Dalles, knelt in meditation for a moment, and then placed the muzzle of a pistol in his mouth and pulled the trigger. He died before a physician could arrive.

Three hundred thousand bushels of wheat of the 1926 Umatilla wheat crop has been sold within the last two weeks, it was estimated by Henry Collins of Pendleton. Approximately 60 per cent of this year's crop has been sold, he said, at an average of \$1.20 a bushel.

Governor Pierce issued an order establishing a quarantine against the shipment into Oregon of sheep from Wyoming, Washington and California, unless they are certified by inspectors of the federal bureau of animal husbandry as originating in territory free from sheep scab infection.

Thomas B. Kay as state treasurer borrowed \$140,000, to meet the demands on the general fund of the state which was exhausted early in the month. Mr. Kay has estimated that an additional \$300,000 will be required before the second half taxes are received at his department in November.

Lane county's share of the Oregon and California railroad grant land taxes, soon to be received from the government, is \$1,082,573.43, according to announcement by Ben F. Kenney, assessor, who has had a man at work since July figuring out the amounts due the county and each tax levying district.

State-wide effort to reduce the number of diphtheria deaths has been launched by the state board of health, Dr. Frederick D. Stricker, secretary, has announced. To cut down the number of deaths this year, all physicians have been called on by the board to issue diphtheria anti-toxin and toxin-anti-toxin.

Governor Pierce again submitted to the secretary of state revised salary claims at the Oregon state penitentiary aggregating \$1774.60, drawn against the prison revolving fund. The secretary of state previously refused to approve these claims on the ground that they should have been drawn on the salary fund.

Methodist churches in the conferences of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana have pledged financial support to Kimball College of Theology at Salem, according to a report filed with the trustees of the institution by Dr. John M. Canse, new president, and Edward L. Mills, president of the board of directors.

A movement to popularize and perhaps commercialize the lithia water of Ashland is being undertaken. New analyses of the water are to be procured and an attempt will be made to interest capital in the construction of a health sanitarium near the city or the main lithia water springs, a few miles south of Ashland.

Four carloads of hops were shipped from Eugene by T. A. Livesly & Co., to Peoria, Ill., where they will be used in the manufacture of malt syrup, which has a large sale in the east and middle west, according to hop dealers.

The 16th semi-annual 4-L district board meeting and convention for the fir territory of Oregon was held in Eugene.

Outstanding features of the annual Oregon Reclamation congress, which convened for a three-day session at Hood River, were a proposal for a reclassification of Oregon irrigation laws, and the adoption of measures that will enable settlers on the lands of projects that have passed through periods of depression to refinance themselves.

The dried prune crop of the Willamette valley, including Clarke county, Washington, for the year 1926, aggregated between 50,000,000 and 60,000,000 pounds according to a survey completed recently by Robert Paulus, Salem prune dealer. It was said that when the present orders are filled practically all of the 1926 crop will have been sold.

Fire losses in the state of Oregon exclusive of Portland, during the month of September, aggregated \$804,527, according to a report prepared by the state fire marshal. There was a total of 80 fires reported.

With prices high, Vale clover seed growers are reaping not only a bumper crop, but a pleasing harvest in dollars and cents.

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
