FARMERS ENDORSE DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATES FOR ELECTION

In view of the recent political developments in Lane County, the election committee of the Farmer's Union made the following recommendations in addition to those made at the county convention.

1. We have heard that the railroads are intending to raise freight rates in the Willamette valley what is equivalent to 16 per cent on live stock. The public service commission of Oregon has supervision over such matters. We have little confidence in Louis Bean for this office, he never having shown himself in the past as a friend to farming interests: Therefore we recommend to our farmer friends that they vote for Clyde T. Spooner, democratic nominee for this office.

2. We recommend to our members and all others who have any sense of fairness and decency that they write in the name of H. C. Wheeler on the ballot in the place of John Bell for joint senator from Lane and Linn counties. Mr. Bell was nominated by the Eugene Central Committee of the Lane County republican party. We realize that because of the time limit we may not elect Mr. Wheeler, but we can at least vote for a fair and able man who will not be subservient

to a clique of selfish politicians and a controlled newspaper.

3. Because of this nomination of Mr. Bell, we wish to repeat our recommendation that we vote for Mr. Bailey for state senator from Lane county. We hear much about party fealty, but when party fealty means taking orders from and doing the will of a self elected bunch of cheap politicians, we think as self respecting citizens we are absolved from it. We believe an income tax would more equitably distribute the tax burden that is breaking our backs. We blame Mr. Maglady for the insult of the Dennis resolution. While he is not the parent of it, he acted as mid-wife at its birth, and without his help it could not have been born. He also voted in favor of tampering with the primary law and in the nomination of Mr. Bell we have an example of what would happen if that law were abrogated.

In Mr. Bailey, we have a strong man of proven integrity. Let us elect him and have at least one legislative representative who is free from the sinister influence of the Eugene peanut politician.

YOUTH UNDER CAR IS BURNED BY GASOLINE

Pinned for two hours beneath his overturned automobile, E. V. Hendricks of Jasper sustained painful burns to his hands and arms as gasoline slowly dripped on him from the tank directly above him. The accident occurred last Sunday.

Hendricks was driving alone when his car skidded and overturned. Although he was not at first injured by the accident, he was unable to extract himself from the wrecked car without help.

During the two hours that ensued before assistance came, Hendricks was forced to allow gasoline from the tank to drip steadily on his arms. They were badly burned when he called at a local physician's office for treatment.

Carl Williams, employe of the Fisher Lumber Company in the Marcola district, sustained serious injuries to his eye when struck by a board thrown by a saw yesterday morning. A hemorrhage in the eyeball resulted from the impact of the board, and it is possible that Williams may lose the use of the eye.

DEPOT GETS NEW PAINT; OTHER IMPROVEMENTS

A new coat of paint was given the Springfield Southern Pacific depot this week, and other improvements about the station are being rushed.

The station has been raised to a level with the new tracks. This week, the freight and baggage platform on the north side has been removed entirely, and will not be rebuilt. A new platform, to the south and rear of the station, proper, will be used instead. Overhauling of signal apparatus and cleaning up of the yards generally is being completed.
