

Vote Is Heavy In Favor of Bridge

Willamette Span Costing \$150,000 Assured; Work Probably To Start in Spring

Bringing to a successful termination one of the most vigorous campaigns ever waged in the interest of Springfield development, voters of Lane county gave the Springfield bridge \$75,000 bond issue better than a 2 to 1 favorable vote, paving the way for the construction of a \$150,000 span across the Willamette river here.

Ninety-two out of 101 precincts in the county gave the bridge bonds the following vote: yes, 6714; no, 2814. Springfield, whose citizens led the county-wide campaign in the interest of the important development movement, gave the bonds almost a unanimous favorable vote, as follows: yes, 503; no, 18.

Early in the spring the State Highway Commission, whose appropriation for the span was matched by the bond issue voted by the county Tuesday, will have preliminary work done and will be ready to start on actual construction of the bridge. The span should be completed in the summer.
