County Budget For 1927 Is Fixed at \$350,737.97

Calling for an expenditure of \$350,737.97 for general county expenses and \$128,917.70 for market roads the Lane county budget has been prepared by the county budget committee for 1927. The only new item of the budget is \$900 for a rural home demonstration agent.

The market road budget is conditional on half the sum budgeted being paid by the state.

FARM REMINDERS

Presence of discoloration in the stem and vascular region of the potato in Oregon has been found in many year's work at the experiment station to be an unreliable index of the presence of disease-producing organisms. It cannot safely be relied upon as the sole guide in separating sound from diseased stock or planting. More than 12,000 tubers were examined in finding these facts out.

The only method of controlling blight of apples and pear trees in Oregon that has proved at all successful is cutting out all the diseased parts, burning them and disinfecting the wounds. This work promptly and thoroughly done holds the disease to a minimum, but does not always prevent recurrence the following year.

Interplanting of Ettersburg 121 strawberries with other varieties for pollination has been found ineffective by Oregon growers as well as by the state college. Nearly all commercial plantings of this variety have been interplanted at one time or another to get them to bear fruit on the terminal blossoms. Pollen from other varieties proved no more effective than pollen of its own variety.

The most injurious cutworms in Oregon spend the winter as immature caterpillars in the soil, says the experiment station. They are present in the spring and all set for a foray on the new crops as soon as the plants push their tops through the soil. All that cannot be destroyed by burning or burying of plant remnants under which they hide, are best dealt with by poisoned bran. Results are inexpensive, quick and sure.

POULTRY HINTS

From O. A. C.

Water is always necessary for the fowls when they come off the roasts in the morning, when electric lights are used.

Birds are frequently brought into production by the use of a wet mash fed in the hoppers in the same manner as the dry feed. A quart of fish meal or meat to every 100 birds is mixed in the mash.

Poultrymen who understand proper feeding and management do not use tonics or dopes of their flocks.

Birds for Thanksgiving market are fattened quickly by heavy corn feeding. A wet mash consisting of 60 per cent ground corn, 40 per cent shorts and enough buttermilk to make a batter is used.

Turkeys are not confined for the fattening period.

Poultry dressed for storage is dry picked.

Alfalfa leaves and blossoms are used as green feed when kale and root crops cannot be obtained.

Poultry producing market eggs are fed 1 to 2 pounds of green feed daily for every 100 birds. Breeding poultry are fed all the green feed they will consume.

Breeding hens are forced into a resting period near the last of November and kept out of production until January. This is accomplished by taking away the protein feeds and feeding largely oats and mill run.

Oregon poultrymen are ordering their baby chicks now, some hatcheries being already pretty well sold out.

An increase in grain and a decrease in mash prevents molting, which is likely to come if production of the flock is kept above 60 per cent.

One-half pound of salt is mixed with 100 pounds of mash in every third batch.

Litter is watched carefully and changed before it becomes damp and heavy. A six-inch layer of straw is used for the litter.
