LABOR TURNOVER LIGHT IN NORTHWEST AREA

Portland, Dec. 9. (Special)—There is at present a very light labor turnover in the logging and lumber manufacturing industry of the Pacific Northwest, according to the 4L employment letter published here, which stated that crews in both camps and mills were steady. The holiday shutdown and repair period has not yet generally started, although preparations were to be seen at several operations where fallers and buckers have been laid off.

Most of the districts report a surplus of labor at this time, a usual condition at this season when much construction and other outdoor work has been stopped. The numbers of men in the larger centers are no greater than last year. Some log driving is being done in the Inland Empire district. Heavy rains there have slowed woods work. The pine sawmill industry is at the season's low point, a large number of plants being closed for the season.

CHRISTMAS PACKAGES ON WAY TO DISTANT POINTS

Already Christmas packages are leaving the Springfield postoffice on every mail according to Postmaster F. B. Hamlin. Most of the packages in the mails so far have been destined for distant points, but Postmaster Hamlin was emphatic in drawing attention to the necessity of early mailing even to points nearer to Springfield.

On December 15, he said, additional help will be arranged for the local postal force, in order that the mails may be handled with dispatch. The early arrival of Christmas mails from distant points he sees as a good indication that the later mails will not be too heavy for the local force to handle.

The postmaster predicts that this year's Christmas mailing will be the greatest ever handled by the Springfield office. Chances for an all-time record in postal receipts are good, he declares.

The approach of the holiday season is seen in the gay decorations in store windows on Main street, and Christmas entertainments are being planned by schools and churches. Schools will be given vacation on Friday, December 24, the day before Christmas.

Shrub Planting Season Now

The planting season for shrubs in Western Oregon extends from October to April, says the station landscape specialist. Shrubs are planted any time when ground is in workable condition. Much harm comes from planting in muddy soil. Since weather conditions are uncertain at this time of the year, shrubs are ordered early from the nursery and if the soil is not fit for planting, are "heeled in" until they may be safely planted.

Heavy pruning is done to maintain a balance between the top and the loss of roots in digging. It prevents damage caused by whipping in strong winds. The cuts are made clean just above the nodes or buds and care is used to keep the characteristic shape of the shrub. All dead or diseased branches are removed and burned.

INSTRUCTION IN RED CROSS FIRST AID SAFETY FACTOR

Its Industrial and Educational Service Spreads Throughout the United States.

Signs that the United States is awake to the menace of its increasing accident toll are apparent in the growing interest in first aid instruction as offered by experts of the American Red Cross.

Approximately 20,000 juniors and seniors completed the First Aid course during the fiscal year, passed rigid examinations and received Red Cross First Aid certificates. This represents an increase of 2,500 over the preceding year, and this gain is attributed to the emphasis on health education by various public bodies including not alone the American Red Cross and Government agencies, but life and accident insurance companies, and athletic and recreational groups.

In Dallas, Texas, playground supervisors are required to hold First Aid certificates. In many high schools the subject is included in the regular curriculum. In order to assist in training instructors for this phase of the work, special courses have been conducted in the summer schools of such leading institutions as the University of Maryland and the University of Virginia. Instruction was continued during the year at Loyola University, New Orleans; University of California, San Francisco; University of Kentucky; Temple University, Philadelphia; Peabody Teachers' College and similar educational centers.

Work with the public utilities group has shown an exceptional increase during the year. Classes conducted by fourteen of the associated Bell Telephone companies were continued with increased interest and a number of the companies sponsored intensive courses in First Aid for instructors.

The First Aid Instruction Car of the Red Cross was busy throughout the year. In the 125 cities visited by the car 900 meetings were held with an aggregate attendance of 94,000 persons.

Membership of the people in the American Red Cross makes such services possible, the annual opportunity of pledging support through membership being offered in the Roll Call from November 11 to 25 this year.
