## OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

### Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

Halsey's tax levy is 8.9 mills, the lowest among Linn county cities. It was 9 mills last year.

Salem's population is estimated at 26,750, based on public utility connections and other records.

Oregon City school census of 1926 just completed, shows 1920 children of school age in the city, 983 of whom are boys and 937 girls.

An election in Klamath Falls last week to authorize a levy of \$50,744 over the 6 per cent limitation for city purposes carried by a vote of 252 to 45.

Rupert Carrick, 22, residing near Vernonia, was shot and killed almost instantly by the accidental discharge of a gun in the hands of his brother Alvin, last week.

There is now more than two feet of snow at the summit of McKenzie pass and the route is closed for the winter with but little prospect of its being opened again until spring.

The Presbyterian parsonage occupied by Rev. W. F. Shields and family at Wallowa was destroyed by fire Friday night while the family was attending Christmas eve church services.

To encourage the growing of alfalfa in Lane county, the Eugene Farmers' creamery has announced that it will sell Grimm alfalfa seed at cost to all farmers who desire to try it as a forage crop.

One of the worst winds of the year swept over La Grande last week. Gusts were severe enough to cause some damage. A large plate glass window was blown in and reports told of brick chimneys being blown over.

For the first time in several years Yamhill county is free from all warrant indebtedness, the last warrants being called in last week by Homer Parett, county treasurer. The county will start the new year with a clean slate.

Six of the 21 prisoners in the Marion county jail escaped last week, in broad daylight, by digging a hole in the north wall of the courthouse and climbing a picket fence. Two of them were captured immediately after the break.

A duel, declared by companions of the two boys to have been in fun, ended fatally when James Lowary, 16-year-old newsboy, was shot through the heart by Bob Moyer, 14, of Pendleton. The shooting took place near Pendleton.
