OREGON STATE NEWS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

The Hood River county court appointed W. J. Kocken county fruit inspector.

Oregon's 1926 apple crop is estimated at 3,100,000 boxes, with 5021 cars shipped up to January 15.

A modern 100-room hotel will be built in La Grande this year, according to a late announcement.

Joseph E. Elliott, 45, was killed while blasting stumps at his place one mile northeast of Canby last week.

Receipts of the state real estate department during 1926 aggregated \$17,256.50, according to a report just issued.

The logging camp of Clark & Wilson at Wilark, closed since early December, resumed operation last week with 200 employees.

The Redmond postoffice is now listed as an office of the second class, receipts having gone over the top December 31, with \$250 to spare.

Monmouth voters last week approved the bond issue to purchase a site for proposed new normal school buildings. The vote was 186 to 8.

Both the Bandon and North Bend chambers of commerce have approved the proposed game preserve from the Coquille river at Bandon to the California line on the south.

The potato production of Columbia county this year in shipments eclipses the combined carlots of the last five years, according to A. L. Morris, potato inspector of Columbia county.

The St. Helens Pulp & Paper company began last week shipping its product of kraft paper into the markets of the world. A carload is now leaving each day. There are 250 men on the payroll.

There was collected by the state treasurer during the last two years inheritance tax aggregating \$1,117,000, or approximately \$350,000 in excess of that collected during the preceding biennium.

Thomas W. Riches, Silverton native, died at his home there last week. He was born at Silverton 73 years ago and lived there all his life. He was postmaster from 1888 to 1892 and from 1896 to 1907.

Plans for construction of a sulphite pulp and paper mill of large size at Astoria have been matured, and contract on preliminary construction work has been awarded according to a recent announcement.

An even 10,000 hens have been signed up by Lane county farmers for the proposed branch of the Pacific Poultry Producers, to be established at Eugene, according to Q. S. Fletcher, county agent.

Receipts of the state insurance department during 1926 aggregated \$702,789.32, while disbursements totaled \$32,904.52, according to a report prepared recently by Will Moore, state insurance commissioner.

Fifteen thousand cubic yards of crushed rock has been contracted for to be used on the Oregon-Washington highway from Pilot Rock through Pendleton to Freewater, C. E. Carter, state engineer, announced.

Will Moore, for the past four years insurance commissioner, fire marshal and real estate commissioner under the administration of ex-Governor Walter M. Pierce, resigned his office to become effective February 1.

When Walter E. Smith, formerly of Linn county but now a resident of Klamath Falls, was 4 years old, he swallowed a needle. The other day, when he was 37 years of age, the needle worked out of his body through his hip.

Sheep men of Baker county have organized under the name of the Baker County Wool Growers' association. At the annual meeting to be held about May 15, permanent officers will be elected and a constitution and by-laws drawn up.

There was one fatality due to industrial accidents in Oregon during the week ending January 20, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. The victim was J. C. Longquist, timber feller, of Portland.

Hordes of mice are devastating grain fields in Klamath Falls section of the country and a well organized drive is under way to rid the community of rodents. Five years ago the mice made a similar invasion of grain fields near there.

That the battleship Oregon has fully justified its presence in Portland harbor is the statement contained in a report filed with Governor Patterson by the Battleship Oregon commission. The report shows that approximately 50,000 people paid for the privilege of visiting the ship during the 18 months it has been in the harbor, while another 100,000 persons were admitted to the ship without charge.

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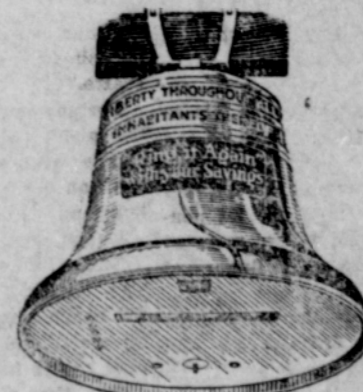
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
