Daughter Who Tells Mother All is Not Bad Dear Miss Flo: Among my acquaintances is a woman who has a pretty little flapper daughter of seventeen. The girl is all that is good and wholesome, and is as innocent and as full of fun as a kitten. But she bobs her hair, paints her face, rouges her lips, dances, joyrides; and all in all goes a pace that must prove demoralizing in the end. When I criticize my friend for permitting her daughter to do these things, she just shrugs her shoulders and says, "What can I do about it? All the other girls make up and act like that, and I can't make her different from the others and spoil her fun."

I think she actually encourages her daughter's wildness, because the daughter tell her everything without fear of being scolded. Don't you think the mother is wrong? —F. R.

The majority of mothers are anything but pleased with the pace their daughters are going—but it isn't easy to bring up the modern young girl with simple, well-bred standards, or by the standards of past generations. Youth will be served! Lock the girl in her room and she will probably climb out of the window. Forbid her to have boys call on her at home, and she will meet them outside. Refuse to let her go to nice club dances, and she will slip away to low dance places. Invariably, the wildest and most reckless girls are those with parents who are too strict. Every intelligent woman knows that it is a mistake for a young girl to make up and to wear clothes that attract attention. As a matter of plain common sense and knowledge of the world they know that a young girl handicaps herself by these methods. She takes away her chief charm—her youth and freshness. By plastering her lovely youthful complexion with rouge and powder, the young girl puts herself on a level with the older woman who may need these adjuncts, and when she destroys the greatest advantage she has how can she compete with the older woman who has the knowledge, experience and poise that the younger girl lacks? Undoubtedly, all mothers know this—but they must also realize that the young people of today are living in the world of today and will do as they do today. Because a girl bobs her hair, paints her lips, rouges her face, dances and joyrides—because she is young, pleasure-loving and irresponsible, is no reason for prophesying dismal things about her. It is a passing phase of life, and she will get over it if she is given a little time and a little understanding. On the other hand, the power of suggestion is strong, and the results may be disastrous if you make the girl think she is reckless and wild, and bound to come to some bad end. So the wise mother tries to develop a sense of humor, and cultivate the spirit of youth in her own heart, that she may have more tolerance, understanding and sympathy with her daughter's seeming reckless spirit. She makes an effort to become her daughter's confidante, as your friend has done, that she may keep close enough to her to know what she is doing and to keep her sense of proportion from becoming distorted. Lucky is the mother whose daughter tells her everything with out fear of being punished and scolded, for it is the understanding mother who can sympathize with her daughter's desire for good times and help her to get them who gets well enough acquainted with her daughter to help her and protect her.
