## GOODYEAR MANUFACTURES HUNDRED MILLION TIRES

"The manufacture of the hundred-millionth Goodyear pneumatic tire in the factories of The Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company at Akron, Ohio, recently, is important to every car owner," according to W. H. Adrian Goodyear dealer at Springfield.

"It means," he said, "that the fullest experience in the manufacture of tires in the world, is behind every tire that Goodyear turns out."

"The many improvements in tire building worked out in Goodyear laboratories, including the first practical cord tire, the pneumatic truck tire, and the new balloon tire, are responsible for this huge volume of sales."

"Goodyear first began producing tires in 1898," he said. "In the early years of the company the output was confined to bicycle and carriage tires, so that the one hundred million tires include only the pneumatics for motor vehicles manufactured by Goodyear since 1902."

"Over three million solid and cushion tires and thousands of bicycle tires of an earlier era are omitted in this all-time Goodyear pneumatic production total."

"It would require 55,524 freight cars making up a railroad train more than 420 miles long to transport the one hundred million pneumatic tires of Goodyear. If the tires were linked together, it would make a chain 48,909 miles long, enough to span the earth twice at the equator."

"During the period required to produce this total, Goodyear has become the largest rubber company in the world, employing the biggest research and engineering departments in the tire industry and a sales organization operating in every country in the world except Russia."

"On the day the hundred-millionth tire was produced at Akron, the second tire of this series was built in the Goodyear Canadian factory at New Toronto and the third at the Goodyear plant at Los Angeles."

"The hundred millionth tire was the new All-Weather balloon type developed after two years' experimentation and announced early in January."

"Incidentally," Mr. Adrian said, "More than one million of these new tires were sold in eighty days following the initial announcement."
